## Froelich Museum

The village of Froelich was once a thriving community that boasted a depot, sawmill, blacksmith shop, creamery, post office, hatchery, stockyards, ice house, barber shop, shipping warehouse and church. Today this is a village that is preserving the past for our future generations to visit, allowing them to learn and appreciate this wonderful history.

The Froelich village is a town with a big story. Froelich is the home to John Froelich the man with a vision. In this village, John Froelich built the first gasoline tractor that propelled itself backward as well as forward. This tractor organized the Waterloo Gasoline Traction Engine Company which later became the John Deere Tractor Company.

Today the village of Froelich is a Museum with rich history; we have the Burlingame's General Store restored to original form of the 1891, the replica of the 1892 Froelich Tractor, restored one-room school, Vintage Barn of 1900, railroad depot, blacksmith shop and a small-scale semitractor display. The village will take you back in time and help you remember your yesterdays, allowing you to appreciate today's modern technology.

The village is open 11-5 daily except Wednesdays during the summer months, open 11-5 Saturdays and Sundays in September and October.

Our annual Fall-der-all days are September 29 and 30, 2012. Some of the highlights on Sat-



## Colony Brands

Ray Kubly grew up on his parents' dairy farm outside of Monroe, WI, in the heart of "cheese country." It came as no surprise then, when he started a mail order cheese business after graduating from UW-Madison in 1926. Often remembered as a man who liked to dream big, his business started out small - shipping just 50 orders of Swiss cheese his first year.

Ray named the company The Swiss Colony in honor of the Swiss immigrants who had settled in Green County. The company grew slowly but steadily, and by the 1960s was shipping more than 5 million pounds of cheese per year. With the addition of an in-house bakery, The Swiss Colony added delicacies such as Petits Fours and Dobosh Tortes to its growing list of catalog offerings.

In 1982, the company produced its first "non-food" catalog, called Gift Collection (later changed to Seventh Avenue). This very successful marketing tool was later joined by a variety of brands including Ginny's, Midnight Velvet, Country Door, and Monroe and Main. Within the last few years the company purchased the Ashro catalog

and the ever-popular Montgomery Ward catalog. From this collection of catalogs (and websites), customers can order just about anything - from apparel and jewelry to home furnishings and electronics.

The Swiss Colony (recently renamed Colony Brands to reflect the diversity of companies) branched out into other communities too, starting with a production facility in Madison, WI, in 1973. Today the company employs more than 1,000 regular employees and about 5,000 temporary employees in 12 communities across the Midwest. This includes four






## Plant Talk

### We are the Enemy

Before we get much closer to fall, I'd like to address a growing concern in the world of plants: human ignorance. Now, I'm not meaning the simple ignorance of not knowing one plant from another; rather, I'm speaking more about a global ignorance of what we are doing to our entire ecosystem. The debate over global warming is beyond ignorance and it's simply stupid to assume human beings have not screwed up the system. Similarly, albeit perhaps less obviously, humans have caused a number of shifts in what's occurring globally with nature.

Two simple examples will show what I mean. In several columns over the past three years I've written about the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) and I've suggested ways to protect—at least in the short term—one or two trees you might have on your property. I've been clear that EAB is not an “if” but “when” concern. Well, that time is upon us and we are on the verge of a long battle of decline of Ash trees in the state of Iowa. Few will be left standing over the next decade or two. We brought this upon ourselves through importation of the insect from Asia.

In another case, our state is the world leader—yes world leader—in the production of Eastern Black Walnut. No other state or country can match the board feet of walnut that is produced in Iowa. Yet, because of the potential for human ignorance, we stand to lose our trees in future generations if we fail to keep the walnut trees growing in a small spot in Arizona out

of Iowa. Why? Because there is a fungus called “thousand cankers disease” attached to those particular trees that, if brought into our state in walnut wood from Arizona, will destroy all our trees. Yet human ignorance will cause people to bring in walnut in trunks or trailers and spread the fungus among our trees. The revenue loss will be in the billions of dollars.

As readers of this column, I'm assuming you have an affinity for plants. Given that, I'm asking you to make an effort to go online and remove a bit of personal ignorance from your life. Start by doing a search of “Native Iowa Plants” and learn about trees, shrubs, grasses and forbs (flowers) native to our state. Make conscious selections of these natives for your gardens this fall or next spring. Natives are simply hands-down hardier and better for our gardens. Next, go to <http://www.invasivespeciesinfo.gov/unitedstates/ia.shtml> and learn about invasive plants and pests in Iowa. Here you'll be shocked—I hope—and will help educate other gardeners and plant lovers about these problems.

Finally, I want to urge you to make two trips this month. First, if you've not visited the arboretum recently—GO! It is one of our true gems, and the volunteers who put in hours and hours of their time have created one of the most inviting places to walk through anywhere in 100 miles. You can learn about many kinds of gardens while also seeing what many of our native species look like up close. Second, visit the Farmer's Market on a Saturday morning. Again, we have within our city one of the best places to buy fresh produce you'll ever find. Buying locally helps insure we not only support the local economy but it aids in helping us reduce entering invasive “bugs” into our ecosystem.

Finally, I'd like to suggest you find time, maybe this winter, to look into natural methods for controlling garden pests. From using lady bugs and Praying Mantis to incorporating natural strains of bacillus to kill pesky insects, we can work together to help restore some balance to nature. I fear if we do not take notice soon, we won't have much of an ecosystem left to worry about. Perhaps this won't occur in my lifetime, but I'm hoping generations of my family will know my name in the family genealogy records I leave behind. I want them to smile as warmly at my “ancient” photograph as I still do at my 19th century ancestors who came here as farmers from Germany during the potato famines.

**Now Here's a Tip**

• Got lots of fresh herbs from your summer garden? Hang bunches upside down in a cool, dry place for a week or so, and then crumble the leaves into small jars. Voila! Your own dried herbs.

• "Want super-crunchy fries at home? Soak potato pieces in very cold water for an hour (fridge is best, or add ice often): dry and fry. Drain well, dust LIGHTLY with flour and quick-fry one more time for only a minute or so."

• If you want to cool your canned drinks quickly, add water to the cooler with a lot of ice, submerge

all drinks below the ice line, and wait about 20 minutes. Without the water, it takes much longer. The water extends the surface contact of the ice.

• To keep your ladder from sinking into soft sand or dirt, put each leg into a can or bucket. It creates a much larger surface area, thereby stabilizing the legs.

• If you run out of bleach, add four tablespoons of hydrogen peroxide to a small load of whites.

• "Be certain to use only distilled water in your iron. The water from the tap can leave mineral stains on clothing, and will destroy your iron if you use it all the time."

**Wall At Market House Collapses Last Week**


One of Galena's outstanding landmarks, the City Market House on Market Square, is giving up to the ravages of time. This last weekend the brick wall

**Time Management Tools to Use**

"We all have 24 hours each day. Time does not change," said Susan Taylor, Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, Family Finance Specialist. Do you every say, "where did the afternoon go?"

First, find your time-wasters; as they can steal your time. Do you spend time on the computer – reading e-mail, or net surfing? Or do you make personal calls? All take up time. Recently, my mother finally realized it was easier to manage 20 e-mails a day than 200. About every day she checks her e-mail. I have been encouraging her to continue that behavior.

You may want to look at 15 minute time slots to see what you are doing for a day from the time you get up to the time you go to bed. You will find the time of day that you are most productive. Here are things we just do, like bathing, getting dressed, and eating meals. We all have our peaks and valleys of productivity.

Remember, the focus of time management is actually changing your behaviors, not changing time. After you have tracked how you use time, try to eliminate your personal time wasters. If you can block your time out and not take interruptions like phone calls, you will accomplish more. When working on a project like making window treatments for a room, I want time to cut the fabric, pin it

and then sew as much as I can in one sitting. That eliminates me from having to reread the instructions. That takes time and you waste time when you have to start over.

**Time Management Personalities Types**

Are you always putting out fires? Then you would be a fireman. Are you on the phone all the time? Then you would be Chatty Kathy. If you can't say "No," then you are the over-committer. Are you too laid-back, but you don't finish tasks or return phone calls? Then you would be the Aquarian. Do you want to do it right – dot the "i's and cross the "t's? You are the perfectionist.

Look at the things you're involved in. Do you enjoy them? Or do they control you?

Use time management tools that work for you. It may be a calendar, a day planner or your cell phone that has a program called Outlook. It lets you schedule events easily and remind you in advance.

You may want to write down the things you want to get done today or this weekend. Many times we write down more than we could accomplish in the time given. Look at the ones that are most important. Those are the items you will get done. Is there someone else that can assist you with the other items on your list? That is delegating.

Make your time work for you. It will make each day enjoyable for you.

During the golden days of radio, the quiz program was a very popular part of those by-gone days when radio was most important in bringing into homes entertainment of a variety of types. The quiz programs were usually heard in the afternoons and sometimes in the evenings.

*Queen For A Day* was a 30-minute daytime audience participation show, on which some female member of the studio audience was awarded new clothes, dinner on the town, and a tour of the best known nightspots, as well as her own fondest wish. The original version of the program was hosted by Dud Williamson, and origi-

nated in New York. Before the end of the first year the program moved to Hollywood, and Jack Bailey took over as emcee for the remainder of the long run.

The audience was canvassed before each show, looking for interesting candidates. Those selected told their stories and their desires on the air, and a panel of audience members selected a winner. Gene Baker and Mark Houston were announcers. The program was heard over MBS and ABC from 1945 to 1957 and made a successful transition to television.



## New Orleans Bread Pudding

2 (4-serving) packages sugar-free vanilla cook-and-serve pudding mix  
4 cups skim milk

1 teaspoon coconut extract 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
8 slices reduced-calorie French or white bread, torn into pieces  
1/2 cup raisins 2 tablespoons flaked coconut  
2 tablespoons chopped pecans 1 teaspoon rum extract  
2 teaspoons reduced-calorie margarine

Preheat oven to 360 F. Spray an 8-by-8-inch baking dish with butter-flavored cooking spray.

In a large skillet, combine 1 package dry pudding mix and 2 1/2 cups skim milk. Cook over medium heat until mixture starts to boil, stirring constantly with a wire whisk.

Remove from heat. Stir in coconut extract and nutmeg. Add bread pieces, raisins, coconut and pecans. Mix gently to combine.

Pour mixture into prepared baking dish. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes. Place baking dish on a wire rack while preparing sauce.

In a medium saucepan, combine remaining package of dry pudding mix and remaining 1 1/2 cups skim milk. Cook over medium heat until mixture thickens and starts to boil, stirring constantly with a wire whisk. Remove from heat. Stir in rum extract and margarine.

Cut bread pudding into 6 pieces. For each serving, place a serving of bread pudding on a dessert plate and spoon about 1/4 cup warm rum sauce over top.



Opening lead — six of clubs.

Let's say you're in three notrump and West leads the six of clubs. There appears to be nothing to the play, so you take East's king of clubs with the ace and return a low diamond. West follows low, but when you win with dummy's queen, East shows out, and there you are - in danger of losing the contract. In due course,

you find that no matter how you twist and turn the best you can do is go down one.

You could attribute the result to bad luck, if you were so inclined, but the plain fact is that if you played the hand this way, the outcome is really your own fault.

The moment dummy comes down, you can see that the contract is ice cold if the diamonds are divided 2-2 or 3-1. The only threat is an unlikely - but possible - 4-0 break. Granting that a 4-0 diamond division is only a 1-in-10 possibility, that does not excuse the failure to make provisions for it.

Once you've developed the habit of worrying about such things, it becomes clear that the right play at trick two is the jack of diamonds, not the deuce. If West has all four diamonds, leading the jack will enable you to make four diamond tricks - and the contract - because dummy's K-Q-7 will eventually swallow up West's 10-9-4 with the aid of repeated finesses.

It is true that if East has all four diamonds, leading the jack won't help you a bit. But if that is the actual case, there's absolutely nothing you can do to salvage the contract. In bridge, all you're expected to do is to control the controllable.

**Tai Chi Benefits**

In a new study, researchers discovered that seniors who engage in tai chi, the gentle Chinese exercise, experienced an increase in brain size and improvements in cognition.

The research was done in a controlled trial, which means that the participants were carefully monitored. The group attended tai chi classes three times a week, as well as a social discussion afterward. The results showed an increase in brain function, as well as improved results on memory and thinking tests. It's thought that the gentle movements of tai chi, as well as the social interaction, was able to reverse the gradual loss of nerve cells in the brain that leads to dementia.

Tai Chi has been explored in other research as well, with positive results.

Arthritis: Seniors with knee osteoarthritis improved physical function after learning tai

chi, and experienced less pain. Participants took a 60-minute class that included instruction in breathing and relaxation, twice a week for three months. A control group received only diet instruction and did stretching exercises. At the end of the three months, those who took the tai chi classes experienced "a significant decrease in knee pain." According to the research, 4.3 million seniors have knee osteoarthritis.

Depression: Seniors who attended a weekly tai chi class experienced improvement in their depression, memory, quality of life and energy.

Prevention of falls: Multiple studies have shown that tai chi's slow exercise movements and deep breathing are effective in helping to prevent falls.

Ask your doctor if tai chi could be beneficial to your overall health. If you call your senior center to inquire about tai chi classes, ask whether the instructor is experienced in working with seniors.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** I am a black woman writing on behalf of my boyfriend. He has a crop of little bumps on his face. I asked him if they are pimples, and he laughed. He said they're shaving bumps. How does he get rid of them?

**ANSWER:** Men of any race can develop shaving bumps. Black men's hair is more tightly coiled, and they, therefore, are quite susceptible to them. If a man cuts his facial hair too closely to the skin, it can spring back toward the skin and penetrate it. Tightly coiled hair is especially prone to this. The sharp end of the hair pushing back into the skin acts like a foreign body. It irritates the skin and inflames it. A little bump forms.

It must be a chore for your boyfriend to shave. To get rid of the bumps, he has to stop shaving until they go away. He also has to dislodge all the hairs that have penetrated the skin. He can do this by taking a clean needle and slipping it under the loop that the hair makes. Then he pops the end of the hair out of the skin. When he frees all the ingrown hairs and stops shaving, his skin will clear.

To prevent new bumps when he resumes shaving, he has to adopt a different shaving style.

He must soften his beard with soap and warm water before using a razor. He will do himself a favor by buying an electric razor and putting it on a setting that doesn't shave the beard too closely.

With either a blade or an electric shaver, he should shave in the direction of hair growth, and he shouldn't pull his skin taut.

If he goes through all this and doesn't meet with success, he'll have to see a doctor. In fact, if his shaving bumps are crusted with dried pus, he should start out by seeing a doctor. The pus indicates infection, and he'll need an antibiotic cream to get rid of any infection.

If your boyfriend is squeamish about freeing the ingrown hairs with a needle, you can do the job for him. You're the one who set all this in motion.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** I wonder if you will answer my question, which concerns our medical records. Are we, as patients, entitled to request our medical records in order to deliver them to a new doctor?

**ANSWER:** Laws regarding the ownership of medical records vary from one state to the next. However, in most states, the doctor and hospital own the medical records.

However, you are entitled to get a complete copy of your records. The doctor or the hospital can charge a reasonable fee for copying them.

If the doctor or hospital refuses to comply, contact your county or state medical society.



YESTERDAY AND TODAY  
BY MICHAEL GIBSON

Dubuque has numerous streets and boulevards which offer gorgeous views not only of the river, but also of well landscaped lawns and flower gardens. One such street is appropriately named Grandview Avenue. Obviously, it was not one of the streets on the original plat of the city nor was it always called Grandview. The August 27, 1865 Dubuque Herald provides some insight into what the early city leaders had in mind regarding such a magnificent thoroughfare. The fact that Dubuque was beginning to recover from the economic panic of 1857 and several citizens saw the need for internal improvements such as street improvements and new construction.

The newspaper spoke about the "Grand Avenue on the bluff... beginning on Julien Ave. (now University) and proceeding southwest...to its intersection with the Military Road." It had several advantages "it is dead level from end to end, it is eighty to one hundred feet wide; it has plank sidewalks ten feet wide... and bordered by shade trees the whole length, making it a most elegant promenade that can be imagined for moonlight walks and evening rambles." It was also noted that real estate values would increase along such a beautiful street to "perhaps \$1,000 per acre."

This avenue was once called

Boundary Street because it marked the western city limit. Just how or exactly when the name changed is not known; except that someone mentioned that it "certainly offered a grand view" and the name remained two words Grand View. In 1871 the city engineer was ordered to plot and stake out an avenue along the highest ridge with curves to be minimized if possible. A 64 foot wide street was planned running approximately two miles in length from Julien (now University) to Southern Avenue. Any fences that were already erected were to be set-back or removed.

And when residents objected the city sent the city marshal, some street commissioners, and "eight wagons and some 45 workers" to re-position or remove fences. It was reported one resident protested so vehemently that he pulled a gun on the sheriff, but didn't shoot. A long series of lawsuits ensued, but in the end the city won out, the fences were removed, and the street was opened on May 1, 1873.

A few years later, another legal squabble took place when the street was macadamized. Small pieces of stone (gravel) were laid on the dirt surface and by the 1920s the gravel was mixed with tar as a bonding agent. Today most roads are made of asphalt or concrete,

but the early roads like Grand View consisted of loose gravel without any bonding agent. The residents along the street were assessed a fee for the macadamizing. The mayor had failed to sign the ordinance and the citizens refused to pay the assessment fee and the case went before the Iowa Supreme Court which ruled that the residents did not have to pay the fee and so the city incurred the full cost of the macadamizing.

Improvements to the avenue continued with new sidewalks in 1878 and lamps installed in 1881. The following year the city employed a garbage man to collect trash along the nicely manicured avenue. The street became a very popular location for Sunday afternoon horse races. The Union Electric trolley had a main line which ran up and back on what was then South Dodge (now Bryant Street) with a turn-around at the old Donahue Grocery (Milk House) where Bryant and South Grandview intersect. On Sundays, the trolleys would be full of spectators for the horse races.

The residents began to enjoy what this new avenue brought to their neighborhood. In fact, in 1908 they signed a petition to have a parkway established in the center of the street. After some deliberation the city aldermen decided to create a 15 foot

wide curbed median that would run from Julien to Southern Avenue and that it would contain flower beds. Of course, some 30 years later, thanks to the generosity of Mr. & Mrs. E.B. Lyons a portion of the so-called Peony Trail includes the Grandview Avenue median which is now sodded with lovely flower beds are interspersed. The distance from University Ave. to Southern Avenue is 1.5 miles and takes approximately 5 minutes to drive at the 25 mph speed limit. But to really appreciate the beauty one should walk and become immersed in the grandeur of the avenue.

There is no question that today South Grandview Ave. has become a mecca for walkers, joggers, bicyclists, and sightseers in cars. It has become a destination point within the city itself and while it may not rank with the 4<sup>th</sup> Street Elevator or Shot Tower for tourists, it will always remain one of the showcase streets in Dubuque—indeed a street with a “grand view.”

Humans enjoy surprises--at least pleasant ones. I think "serendipity" might be my favorite word. I think of it as meaning "accidental bliss." I spoke at a large gathering in Columbus, Ohio. After my talk, a man approached me. I didn't know him, but I could tell that he'd attended the same school as I had. I saw his class ring when he picked his nose. I was surprised. I wasn't surprised because he picked his nose. After all, he went to the same school I had. I was surprised to find a piece of home far away. Then he surprised me further with a riddle that he assured would be no hill for a stepper like me. "What's green and has wheels?" he asked. I didn't know and told him so. He smiled broadly before saying, "Grass. I lied about the wheels." I was surprised that a grown man would say such a thing until I once again noticed the class ring. Marcel Proust said, "The real voyage of discovery consists not in seeking new landscapes but in having new eyes." Apparently, Proust was an optician. I've spent much time walking in the company of dogs. A dog has new eyes each day--it finds surprises everywhere. It expects to be surprised and is never disappointed. If surprises were water, all dogs would drown. Each year, farmers seem surprised, pleasantly or otherwise, by the crop. I heard someone with a few miles on him say, "Nothing surprises me anymore!" Everything surprises me. I'm surprised at how accomplished some people are at parallel parking. I'm surprised how much of the day is first class. Think about flying economy--how cramped

and uncomfortable it is. Then think about how comfortable and roomy it is when you're not flying. You are living first class. I hope that puts a lilt in your step. A mother took her little boy to church. The little boy said, "Mommy, I have to tinkle." The mother said to the little boy, "It's not appropriate to say the word 'tinkle' in church. So, from now on whenever you have to 'tinkle,' say that you have to 'whisper.'" The following Sunday, the little boy went to church with his father and during the service, he said to his father, "Daddy, I have to whisper." The father replied, "OK, whisper in my ear."

I'll bet the father was surprised.

We are easily surprised because real life doesn't provide danger or merry music as movies and TV shows do. You shouldn't be surprised if you can't afford to retire if you've spent every dime on lottery tickets. Ole didn't like surprises. One winter, Ole asked Lena to walk across the lake and get him some snus from the store. She said, "I'll need money." He told her to charge it. She asked, "Why won't you give me the money?" Ole said, "I don't know how thick the ice is." I'm surprised what a big chunk of the day it takes to put gas in my car. Gassing up has become a Sisyphean task. When I had a gas barrel on the farm, it took no time at all.

In 1900, electric cars outsold cars that ran on gas. The 1902 Phaeton built by the Woods Motor Vehicle Company had a range of 18 miles, a top speed of 14 mph, and cost \$2,000. Those numbers are the same as a 2012 iPhone. In 1916, Woods offered a hybrid car with an internal combustion engine and an electric motor. Electric vehicles lacked the vibration, smell, and noise of gas-powered cars. Changing gears on gasoline cars was difficult and electric vehicles didn't require that. Steam-powered cars also had no gear-shifting, but needed long start-up times on cold mornings. Steam cars had less range before needing water than an electric car's range per charge. An electric vehicle didn't require hand cranking. I've never owned an electric or a steam-powered car, but I do remember when gas prices remained unchanged for months. Now I'm surprised when prices stay the same for a few days.

When gas prices drop, it's serendipity.







August 26 is known as Women's Equality Day. On that date in 1920, the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was signed, giving women the right to vote.

Social Security treats men and women equally. Men and women with identical earnings histories are treated exactly the same. However, there are things women in particular should know about Social Security. Although treated equally by Social Security, there are trends and differences in life-style that can affect benefits.

For example, women tend to care for many people: spouses, children, and parents. Taking time away from the workplace to care for a newborn child or aging parent can have an impact on your future Social Security benefits.

Also, despite significant strides through the years, women are more likely to earn less over a lifetime than men.

Women are less often covered by private retirement plans, and they are more dependent on Social Security in their retirement years.

And, women tend to live about five years longer than men, which means more years depending on Social Security and other retirement income or savings.

If a woman is married to a man who earns significantly more than she does, it is likely she will qualify for a larger benefit amount on his record than on her own.

#### Work-at-Home Scams: Money for Nothing

Want to make some easy money from home, set your own hours and be your own boss? It sounds too good to be true, and that's because it is! The person who generally ends up making money in work-at-home schemes isn't you—it's the person who collected your up-front "investment" in an empty promise.

The "opportunities" can include envelope stuffing, assembling products at home, medical billing, multi-level marketing, "mystery shopping," or re-shipping. While some offers may be legitimate, most are scams. Some may violate local zoning ordinances, state licensing requirements, state law or federal law, and a few may even involve organized crime fronts.

First and foremost, don't reply to unsolicited or spam "work-at-home opportunity"

emails. Treat spam as a scam. These are almost always bogus offers. Clicking on spam email can also expose your computer to viruses.

What kind of work is it? How will you be paid—salary or commission (and will you ever see that commission)? Who will pay you, and when will you be paid? Are the claims of how much you'll likely earn even realistic? If the "job" entails nothing more than you trying to find others to pay for the same "opportunity," it's a fraud. If you're supposed to cash a check to go "mystery shopping," there's no mystery about it: it's also a fraud and you'll be out the amount of the check you cashed. If you're supposed to earn money by "processing payments", "transferring funds" or "reshipping" merchandise, you're likely taking part in a criminal offense.

Most schemes involve sending money in advance, and that's a red flag that someone other than you is likely the one making money. Some home-based businesses do require investments, but many are fraudulent businesses that try to collect advance payments for goods or services like shipping, "starter kits" or training materials, and inventory. NEVER send money through a wire transfer! Use a credit card (NOT a debit card), if possible, which offers you some protections if the company tries to cheat you out of money.

Advance pay to you? Be careful! A company sends you an "advance in pay," then claims it overpaid you and demands you to send the difference. What likely is happening is you deposited a fake check, it will take the bank some time to detect the fraud, you have sent an "overpayment" amount to someone else, and you will owe your bank the entire amount of the bad check you deposited.

Research the company BEFORE you do business. Have you ever heard of the company? Has anyone posted information about their experience with this

company? Does the company have a physical address or is it only a post office box? Check resources like the Better Business Bureau, the Iowa Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) or even a search engine for reports about the company.

Don't give out personal information – someone who requests personal information about you, including your Social Security number or bank account information, may be trying to steal your identity.

What's the company's refund policy? Ask the company for a written refund policy. Will the company give you a refund under any circumstances? How long do you have to request a refund? If you paid by credit card and wish to dispute a charge, contact the credit card company as soon as possible.

**DMASWA Medical Sharps Acceptance Policy**

At the June meeting of the Dubuque Metropolitan Area Solid Waste Agency (DMASWA), a new policy was approved for accepting medical use sharps from Dubuque and Delaware county residents at the DMASWA Household Hazardous Materials Facility.


Medical use sharps most commonly found in homes are needles and syringes used for the treatment of diabetes and other diseases. They are now accepted without charge from Dubuque and Delaware county residents if delivered inside a certified "Bio-hazard" sharps container or a labeled, rigid, puncture-resistant bottle with a secured cap. It is preferred that a DMASWA "Sharps" label be on the bottle. If sharps are delivered in non-compliant containers, a proper sharps container will be provided and a fee

charged for it. The sharps will subsequently be shipped to a medical waste incinerator near Mason City.

The DMASWA Household Hazardous Materials Facility is located at the DMASWA Landfill on the north side of U.S. Highway 20 on Dubuque's west side. It is open from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays. No appointments are necessary.

## Memories Passed On (As told to my grandson Maury)

### The Best Of Jerry

**"Road Warriors" Or  
(3 Games in 24 Hours  
Plus 300 Miles!)**

The term "road warriors," Maury, is common in sports jargon. It refers to a team playing games away from home - or "on the road." Like most ball clubs we were scheduled about 50-50 - home and away. With this baseball memory, Maury, grandpa is going to tell you about one of the zaniest road trips our ball club ever had.

Our business manager at that time was Ed Whalen. (He was also the Dubuque County Clerk and a Justice of the Peace). Ed arranged our complete schedule for the summer. For our home games, he scheduled the area's best semi pro teams, the top traveling Negro teams and ended the season with Russ Meyer's barnstorming major leaguers. For all games away from home, as our team's reputation grew, we demanded a minimum guarantee of \$500 or 50 percent of the gate, whichever was the higher.

In the late '40s and early '50s, (taking inflation into account), this was considered good money. (Maury, there's another "grown up" word for you to learn and you can ask an expert to tell you what "inflation" means - your DAD!).

Except for the teams that were top attractions, we usually made out financially much better on the road. At home we had to pay rent to the city for use of the ball park, pay for the lights, umpires, an off duty policeman, furnish the balls, etc. When we played on the road our only expense was getting there. (And on this trip, motel cost).

Well, Maury, it was either miscommunication or Ed being "overly ambitious" because one week end our road schedule called for three games within twenty four hours covering over three hundred miles! Whatever the reason, we had never "broken any contract" and decided we could do it.

The first game was Saturday night in Lansing, IA., the second Sunday afternoon in Viroqua, WI. and the third Sunday night in Soldiers Grove, WI. (This town had just installed lights for their ball park and dedication ceremonies took place that night). One of the things grandpa remembers, Maury, was hanging our sweaty uniforms out of the car windows "to dry in the breeze" as we drove between Viroqua and Soldiers Grove! This was a 50 mile drive and was crucial to completing the trip. (If the Viroqua game had gone extra innings we wouldn't have made it). Traveling in three cars, we had two flat tires on the way home arriving in Dubuque about 3:00 a.m. We did it, Maury! In 24 hours we played three games and drove over 300 miles! We also were one tired ball club! I don't remember the scores but we won all three games!

### From Where I Sit

How will the severe penalty's handed down by the NCAA on July 23 alter the path of Penn State football going forward? Only time will tell. It's the latest fall out from the Jerry Sandusky sexual abuse of minors conviction in June, and the apparent cover up by some Penn State officials including then head coach, Joe Paterno. In a continuing effort to find justice for the victims of Sandusky, Penn State will pay a heavy price. A top verbal recruit for the Nittany Lions has already de-committed to new coach Bill O'Brien and more will no doubt follow. The Big Ten football kick off meetings in Chicago this week, featuring the league's head coaches and a trio of their top players will be an absolute media two day frenzy. After that training camps start opening. Iowa begins practice the first week in August with the Labor Day week-end opener back in Chicago at Soldier Field against Northern Illinois.

Players have been busy with their off season conditioning, lifting and studying the new play book. New in the sense that coordinators Greg Davis and Phil Parker start their initial seasons calling the plays. Phil Parker doesn't need a real estate dealer or a tour of Iowa City. He's been on Coach Kirk

Ferentz staff for 13 seasons as defensive backs coach and takes over for the retired Norm Parker. Phil Parkers first big task is rebuilding the line. The linebackers and secondary are the strength, led by James Morris and Micah Hyde. You can look for subtle changes like more blitzing until the line grows up.

The new look offense will be more aggressive under Davis who comes over from Mack Brown's staff at Texas. With veteran quarterback James Vandenberg at the throttle and veteran receivers returning at tight end and wide out, the Hawkeyes want to throw the ball more. Until a legitimate threat is found at tailback to succeed Marcus Coker, Iowa's best bet to move the ball is through the air. There will be no huddle, hurry up, west coast, spread and conventional looks until Davis settles into a comfort zone. That may take the first month of the season. With four of the first five games inside Kinnick Stadium, the Hawkeyes can overcome some of the mistakes that accompany new game plans and mistakes will be made. You just hope none are fatal.



**How to Cut Mortgage Interest Payments**

The average interest rate for home mortgages recently fell to a 30-year record low. According to Freddie Mac, the rate for a 30-year loan went to 3.66 percent from a previous 3.71 percent.

Many potential home buyers look at that drop in the interest rate and consider it significant. But look at the figures: A \$100,000 loan at 3.71 percent will cost you \$460.85 per month in payments. A \$100,000 loan at 3.66 percent will cost you \$458.02 per month in payments.

That's a savings of only \$2 per month ... unless you calculate the savings over the life of the loan.

At 3.71 percent, that \$100,000 loan will cost you \$65,905 in interest alone, which means you'll pay \$ 165,905 over the 30-year course of the loan.

At 3.66 percent that \$100,000 loan will cost you \$64,888 in interest alone, and you'll pay \$164,888 over the thirty years.

That's a savings of just \$1,017 spread out over 30 years. There's a much better way

to cut the amount the interest you pay.

If the idea of paying off your mortgage early appeals to you, let's increase that extra amount per month to \$200 and look at the figures. The interest over the life of the loan drops to \$35,042, and you pay off the loan 12 years early.

That, not in the tiny drops in interest rate, is where you'll see your greatest savings.

If you're ready to buy, don't quibble about small changes in the interest rate. Do your homework: Get your credit in good shape, assemble your documents (such as tax returns and bank statements) and when it comes to buying, spend less than you've been approved for. Send those extra dollars in with your payment each month and watch your balance drop.

When you want to share a document, saving it in Adobe's portable document format almost always guarantees that the person on the other end will see what you intend. OS X's print dialog box makes it easy to create a PDF from any document, and furthermore you can protect what you want to share. Suppose you don't want viewers to be able to copy the text or images, or save their own copy of the file. You can make a read-only PDF from any Mac OS X application. Pull down to Print in the File menu, click the PDF button, and choose Save As PDF. When you create a PDF this way, the bottom of the OS X Save dialog box includes a button you've probably overlooked – **Security Options:**

Here you can require a password for copying any part of the PDF's content. That includes the text and images. Viewers who try to copy a section of text or an image will either be asked for a password, or they won't be able to copy. This simple and free PDF protection will be sufficient for most users.

### Book Review

*Abandon  
Underworld*  
by Meg Cabot  
(Point. \$17.99)

Meg Cabot's modern-day take on the Greek myth of *Hades and Persephone* begins with *Abandon*, in which readers are introduced to Pierce, a troubled young woman with one heck of a reason to be angst: At age 16, Pierce died — and instead of seeing a tunnel of light, found herself shivering on a dark, cold beach, looking up into one oddly familiar face.

That face belongs to John, former shipwreck victim and current death deity, who rules the ghostly world between life and whatever comes after. It turns out that Pierce's destiny has been entwined with John's for far longer than she ever guessed, and even when she's brought back to life, her reality will never be the same.

In the sequel, *Underworld*, John has rescued Pierce from the dark forces that pursue her and taken her back to his

home in the shadows. She's safe there — as long as she never leaves. But Pierce knows the battle with John's enemies isn't over, and people she loves back at home are going to be caught in the crossfire if she doesn't do something about it. But can she leave John to his lonely existence once again, now that she knows exactly what she's giving up?

The two novels are the start of a satisfyingly romantic-adventure series that should appeal to lovers of both historical drama and contemporary teen angst. The writing is smooth and engaging, sweeping the reader along for the ride from one unexpected situation to the next. Pierce's hometown is a character in its own right, a fictional Florida town modeled after Key West and true to the eccentricity, spirit and beauty of that unique location.

Reverent of the ancient lore even when inserting interesting new twists, Cabot's version of the time-tested tale has a familiar ring, but enough originality to keep the reader uneasy about whether Pierce and John's love story will end in triumph or tragedy.






