#### Small Dog's Aggression Is a Worry

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I have a small, mixed-breed, mostly terrier named Cookie. He's a darling to me and my son, but to anyone else, he's a terror. He is a rescue, so I don't know what his early life was like or if he was properly socialized. But I'm worried about having company over because he will bark ferociously at any strangers. What can I do to stop this? - *Janice L.*,

**DEAR JANICE:** A lack of socialization or an abusive home could be factors in Cookie's aggression. Genetics can also be at play: Some dog breeds were developed to be guard dogs or hunters and may be more aggressive if not trained well.

However, Cookie has accepted you and your son as

family, and that is a positive sign. Follow these tips as you begin the process of reducing his aggression.

— Never force Cookie to meet new visitors or strangers on the street. Let him approach visitors on his own, with you supervising.

 Ask visitors (and people on the street) not to approach Cookie or try to pet him.

 Create a safe space where you can put Cookie when visitors arrive. A kennel cage with water, soft bed and favorite tovs is ideal.


 If Cookie is physically aggressive (charging or snapping), he must stay in his kennel when visitors come, and should always be leashed and wear a muzzle when walking outdoors.

Next, talk to Cookie's veterinarian about a combination of anti-anxiety medication along with a training routine. I recommend working with a trainer so you can implement effective training methods as quickly as possible. With love, training and care, Cookie can become a confident, less aggressive dog.

Recently, I was going through some old hard copy files and found an interesting subject. It was about the games children played in colonial America. No, this is not going to be a nostalgic column. But, I have done some research about games played over the past 200 years by many generations of our history.

Psychologists tell us that children love activity games. Of course, nowadays electronic games are in great demand too. But, I look back on my childhood and recognize some of the games' I played were inherited from my ancestors and are stilled played by children today, but sometimes a game was renamed.

In colonial America, I Spy (hide-and-seek) was basically played like I learned it. You leaned against a tree, closed your eyes, then, counted to one hundred, opened your eyes and tried to find all the other children who were hiding somewhere nearby. You had to call out the name of the one you spotted and then run to the tree and declare that person caught. Of course, if he or she reached the tree first that person was allowed to go and hide again.

Another game that has been around for a long time is marbles, but it is not played

much today. Yet marbles are sold as toys. The game called Button, Button was called Hot Potato in my childhood. We all sat in a circle and one child was given a potato that was held behind the back, then another child would run around the circle and tap the person on the back that had the potato. Then that child would try and catch the other child before they sat down. Some games I played like Kick-the-Can, Jacks, Captain May I, Hop Scotch, and Simple Simon have simply disappeared.

There were many games listed for that time period, but only the ones I mentioned survived my children's childhood. I believe my grandchildren played with marbles, and maybe similar games from the past that were renamed. But, culture to culture invents their own activity games to satisfy the needs of children interacting with each other.

And since I have two great grandchildren in grade school, I thought it might be interesting to find out what games they may be playing during recess time. One teacher I interviewed said that his students just make up their own games in which they run and chase each other while playing with balls or other soft objects made for tossing.

All in all, children need to be together. They have to interact with each other in order to have fun and learn how to share their spare time in healthy playtime.

#### Sleep Is Good!

Almost everything that is written about how to look at life and how to live life well focuses on the 16 plus hours that we're awake. My weekly writing is no different. It occurred to me that I should write something about the 1/3 of our lives (perhaps 1/4 or less for many) we spend sleeping. Because that's a significant portion of our lives, it might benefit us to reflect on how we should view this time we sleep.

A common view is that sleep is something we have to give in to and that you're a more industrious person and a more productive person if you sleep less. Far more people brag about how little sleep they get than the number who brag about the abundance of sleep they get. We're afraid of being considered lazy or maybe seen as unimportant if we admit to getting adequate sleep. And rarely does anyone want to admit to having taken a nap.

Why do we resist wanting to go to bed, often putting it off until it's way past what should be our bedtime? One reason might be that when we climb into bed we have to give up control. We're not going to be able to run anything, fix anything, work on anything, or do anything about anything. We just have to let go, and we don't like doing that!

I recently read a book titled You're Only Human: How Your Limits Reflect God's Design and Why That's Good News by Kelly M. Kapic. He got me to thinking about the value of sleep. There are lots of good reasons to have a healthy respect for sleep and the need for adequate sleep. Science and medicine have always touted the physical and sleep, but Kapic reminds us

that there are spiritual benefits to having a proper view and practice of sleep.

Kapic writes, "Sleep is a spiritual discipline that daily reminds us of our lack of control... Sleep reminds us daily that we can't rescue ourselves: we are never strong enough, we never know enough, we never can do enough to eliminate our vulnerability. And so sleep is an act of faith."

In a way, going to sleep is a sacrament. In the Protestant tradition we have two sacraments, baptism and Communion. A sacrament is an outward act (the being covered with water in baptism and the eating of the bread and drinking of the cup in Communion) that has an inward spiritual meaning. I'm not suggesting adding a third sacrament, a sacrament of sleep, though many people practice it as a sacrament in church! It does seem proper to view sleep as sacramental in nature. It's an outward act which can remind us to embrace an inner conviction that the world doesn't need us 24/7 and to trust God to run things while we sleep. Both thoughts are humbling, and humility is a good character trait to possess.

There's a classic children's bedtime prayer that I learned as a child. "Now I lay me down to sleep. I pray thee, Lord, my soul to keep. If I should die before I wake, I pray thee, Lord, my soul to take." I know, it sounds rather morbid, probably not a prayer most contemporary parents would want their child to pray. But there's a great deal of truth in it, and, for the record, it didn't scar me for life to have prayed it as a child. Laying our head on the pillow at night, or even for a nap, is an opportunity to reaffirm our trust in God.

Maybe a good prayer to pray would be, "Lord, I'm going to sleep now. You take care of me and everything else. Good night!" Okay, I think I've said what I've wanted to say about sleep. I think it's time for a nap!





According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International (ESFI), there are approximately 3,300 fires in the home annually caused by extension cords. On average, extension cord fires kill about 50 people yearly and injure another 270. Another hazard of extension cords is the trips and falls they may cause, especially in adults over the age of 65. Here are some safety tips that can help keep your home and yourself protected when using extension cords.

Extension cords are meant for temporary use. They are not to take the place of permanent wiring. If you are finding that you have lots of extension cords in use because you have few outlets, evaluate if you really need all the things plugged in. Consult with an electrician about having more outlets installed as well.

When using an extension cord, never plug an extension cord into another extension cord or into a power strip. This is called "daisy chaining" and could result in a fire. Always plug larger items such as refrigerators, microwaves, air conditioner units and other appliances directly into wall cityofdubuque.org.

outlets. The heat that these appliances produce can overheat extension cords and power strips resulting in a fire.

Never run extension cords through walls, ceilings or floors or under rugs or doors. Never set items on top of an extension cord such as clothing or other combustible materials. The heat buildup in the cord over time can cause those combustible items to start on fire. Running cords under doors can slowly wear the sheathing off the cord exposing the wires. This could cause an electrical shock or a fire.

Finally, extension cords can cause trip and fall hazards. Many people run extension cords across rooms, down hallways or even down stairways. As we get older, we do not pick our feet up as high when walking. This can result in our feet getting tangled up in an extension cord and falling. If using an extension cord, ensure it does not go across doorways or in areas where you walk.

#### Managing Someone Else's Money: Informal Caregiving Options

Is a family member having trouble managing money because of health problems or memory issues? Or are you planning ahead in case you need help in the future? Knowing your options will help you choose what works best for your situation. An informal caregiver can be helpful on an as-needed basis. Options include the following.

Conversation partner-This allows you to give a trusted relative, friend, or professional an overview of your finances (even if you don't want to share all the details). Ask your broker or banker to send a copy of your statements to an adult child or accountant. Ask a trusted friend or relative to join when you visit your banker or financial adviser.

Trusted contact person-You can add a "trusted contact person" to your brokerage accounts. Some banks may offer this too. It allows your financial institution to contact the trusted person in certain circumstances, like if they believe you're getting scammed. Trusted contacts don't have access to your money—they get notified if the financial institution sees signs of financial exploitation

Convenience account-A "convenience account" or "agency account" lets you name someone to help you deposit or withdraw money and write checks. A convenience account is not the same as a joint account, where money is jointly owned and the joint account holder automatically gets the money when you die. A convenience account does not change the ownership of the money in the account or give your helper the right to keep the money when you die. The money belongs only



#### How to Avoid Calcium While Taking **Thyroid Medication**

DEAR DR. ROACH: I had a thyroidectomy, and I take levothyroxine. Instructions for the medication state not to take it within four hours of consuming calcium. No discussion of the drug has clearly stated whether this only refers to calcium supplements or whether this also includes high-calcium foods.

I usually take levothyroxine when I wake up, between 2 a.m. and 3:30 a.m., to avoid breakfast dairy products (i.e. yogurt, cheese and soy milk) and dinner foods (broccoli, leafy greens, dairy and soy). I go to bed fairly early. I eat mainly plant-based, plus dairy.

I have asked some doctors and pharmacists, only to have them answer with the question: "Doesn't that only apply to supplements?" I don't know! That's why I'm asking. I want my thyroid prescription to work as it's supposed to. Can you shed light on this issue? — E.G.

**ANSWER:** Large amounts of elemental calcium do decrease the absorption of the thyroid hormone, thyroxine. If you were to take thyroxine (Synthroid and others) at the same time as you would a large calcium pill, you could expect the thyroid medicine to be about 7% to 8% less absorbed. (Iron and caffeine also decrease thyroid hormone absorption.)

A glass of cow's milk taken at the same time will decrease

thyroid hormone absorption. Soy milk has not been studied, but I would expect calcium-fortified soy milk to be similar to milk, yogurt and some high-calcium cheeses in their ability to reduce thyroxine absorption.

However, I think you may be taking things too far. One hour is probably adequate enough to separate calcium from thyroxine. Furthermore, if you are consistent in taking your medication, your dose will get adjusted to the correct level. I doubt that vegetables have any effect on absorption.

Finally, in a study of people who took thyroxine sometimes with and sometimes without their calcium, the change was not enough to get them out of the desirable range, although the levels were definitely affected. The dose of thyroid hormone has a little bit of leeway in most people, although some people (such as those with a history of thyroid cancer who are now on replacement therapy after surgery) need to have a very exact dosage. So, avoiding calcium, iron and caffeine in those cases is more critical.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 72-vear-old woman who, over my adult years, has developed allergies to Tylenol and all NSAIDs. Just this week. I developed a rash after taking aspirin, which was my last resort for pain. I was given a prescription for tramadol, but I really don't want to take a narcotic for aches and pains I only have periodically. Instead, I use ice, heat, stretching and exercise, which keep me painfree most of the time. - *T.W.* 

**ANSWER:** I have rarely seen a person allergic to so many classes of medicines, but it can occasionally happen. It's unfortunate, but I certainly agree with you that an opioid (the term narcotic isn't used

#### **Buying a New Vehicle**

We all cringe the day when it becomes apparent that we need to buy a new vehicle. And it's not only the expense that makes us leery. It's the whole process of wondering how we're going to be treated if we go to a dealership.

The best way to handle it is: Do your homework (a lot of it) in advance, as much as you can.

Contact your financial institution about pre-approval for a loan and their interest rates. Know how much vehicle you can buy before you end up at a dealership.

Check Kelley Blue Book online and try to determine what value your current vehicle might have. It might be worth more than you suspect because trade-ins are hot items nowadays.

Try to find something you like that's already on the lot at a dealership that you can test drive so you're not waiting months for delivery.

Still, if you're certain about a particular vehicle, you might see on a dealer website that the vehicle is "in transit" and will arrive "soon." A deposit at the dealership can hold that vehicle for you. Warning No. 1: That deposit will likely be nonrefundable. Warning No. 2: Get it in writing, including the sales price and VIN. In other words, do any haggling before you put down a deposit.

When at the dealership, do not express happy feelings for any certain vehicle or color. Remain noncommittal. Expect them to push you to accept their financing. Don't disclose your credit score when they ask; they're getting ready to start pushing the financing.

Don't disclose that you're already pre-approved for a loan elsewhere until the very end when you've selected a vehicle.

Don't tell them how much you want for your trade-in; they might be ready to offer even more.

And mostly, be willing to walk away if you're pressured too much. If you get tired, go home. There are other dealerships everywhere.

#### \$54 Million in **Kickbacks**

Yetanotherscammerthought he would get away with his crimes. In a recent case, a thief was convicted for his part in a large compounded prescription drug ring, with kickbacks and bribes that included money, dinners and hunting trips.

The Anti-Kickback Statute (AKS) bans offering bribes for

medical care or drugs that aren't medically necessary for patients. This applies to prescriptions that will be paid by TRICARE and Medicare (or any government program), and it was the physicians of those patients who were targeted and encouraged to use a certain pharmacy.

Theft had apparently been going on for many years, likely beginning in 2012. Over the years, the thieves submitted over \$54 million in false claims. Of that, TRICARE had paid out over \$42 million in claims for those drugs. The compounded drugs in question had been rigged to be the most expensive possible to get back the most money in payment from TRICARE, and included drugs and pain/scar creams. The scammers would use "test billing" on fake claims to learn which claims would be paid the best.

TRICARE is the benefit program that provides coverage for retirees, spouses and families, active duty and others. In this case, the thieves submitted fake claims in over 30 states and a few foreign countries (which is likely why the scammer turned over his passport).

The original indictment was dated 2020 and included a whole alphabet of government agencies, including the FBI, Health and Human Services. Department of Defense. Department of Justice and the VA Office of Inspector General.

Meanwhile, several others were charged in the crimes, which included soliciting or
