It goes without saying that point count is enormously helpful in the bidding, but it is also true that point count can be very helpful in the play. Take this deal where South gets to four hearts after West opens a weak notrump, showing 12 to 14 points. West leads the king of diamonds and shifts to a low spade.

Declarer plays low from dummy, overtaking the eight with the nine in order to lead the queen of hearts. When West

covers with the king, South wins with dummy's ace and returns a heart to the jack, learning in the process that West has a trump trick coming.

Declarer must now try to limit himself to one club loser. To accomplish this, he enters dummy with a spade, leads a club toward the K-J and then has to decide what to play after East follows low.


If East has the queen, South should play the jack; if East has the ace, South should play the king. It is a crucial guess, and to solve the problem, declarer turns his attention to the point count.

He knows from the opening lead that West had the A-K of diamonds (seven points). He can tell from the play at trick two that West also has the jack of spades (one point), since East would have covered dummy's eight with the jack if he had it. West has also turned up with the king of hearts (three points), bringing his point count in those three suits to 11.

It follows that West cannot have the ace of clubs, which would give him 15 points. South therefore goes up with the king of clubs and so makes the contract.

#### Modern Furniture

Furniture functions stay more or less the same, but styles change according to advances in technology and the whims of fashion. Even if you're not familiar with the history of furniture, you can tell that a plain Pilgrim trestle table, an ornately carved Victorian sofa and a Bauhaus tubular steel chair belong to different eras.

This flame rocking chair, which sold for \$240 at a Leland Little auction, is unmistakably modern. It was made by contemporary artist Erin Stesch and was auctioned to support an organization that preserves modern residential architecture.

The modern furniture era is generally believed to have begun in the 1940s with the end of World War II and the societal changes and technological developments it brought. Customers wanted inexpensive, functional furniture for smaller living spaces. Companies had new materials to work with and new manufacturing methods. Designers created pieces that were both streamlined and organic, adding visual interest to comfort and practicality.

A relative gave me a ceramic vase several years ago, and I'd like to know more about it. It has raised and glossy owls and leaves. The bottom has an oval mark that reads "Amphora" in the middle and "Made in Czecho-Slovakia" in a border around that. Can you tell me anything about it?

The vase was made by Riessner, Stellmacher & Kessel Amphora. They were one of the best-known pottery makers in Teplitz, Bohemia,

which is now in the Czech Republic. The mark you describe was used by the company from 1918 to 1939. The vase is earthenware with enameled owls, leaves and geometric decorations. A vase like yours recently sold for \$425.

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#### The Ornament

For more than sixty Christmases I have carried on a tradition dating back to 1909 and my Grandmother's first Christmas as a young married woman. That year she hung a gold ball on the tree shared with my Grandfather and for every year after that, only *my Grandmother could hang The Ornament upon the tree until...* 

"Here it is, now you hang it right where we can see it." So were the words of my Grandmother as she carefully unwrapped the gold ball. I hung the ornament on the tree, and she continued the story of this simple piece. "That's the only ornament I have from the first Christmas your Grandpa and I spent together after we were married in 1909. This other one, the little red bell, was from your Aunt Vivian's first Christmas in 1910. Hang it right near the gold one." Every year I went through the same routine with Grandma and I never tired of her telling me the stories. I felt duty-bound to follow set traditions, and putting up my grandparents' Christmas tree was the most sacred duty I had as a young boy.

For my family, as I grew up in the 1950s, the holiday season did not—could not—begin before the Friday after Thanksgiving. On that day we children rushed to our Sears and Roebuck store in Chicago and anxiously waited for Toyland to open. During that weekend my parents, grandparents, and I would climb into the Chevy and go out to Amling's Flowerland to see the displays. On the way home, we stopped to buy our trees, a process that often tested my father's patience to the extreme. Grandma was a choosy shopper, and the tree had to be exactly right. Once purchased, the trees were tied to the top of the car, and a bit off the bottom of the trees

and placed each one in a bucket of water. The next weekend we decorated for the holidays.

The traditions my parents established were like beacons in my life as they guided me toward the right understanding of family and the over-arching meaning of the December madness that prevailed. Our tree stood proudly in the front room bay window. As my father grew older and I got taller, the task of hanging the lights was turned over to me. Holiday music played from the stereo and the multicolored lights cast a warm glow in the room as we hung ornaments. Every so often Mom would relate a bit about some of the older ornaments as we hung them on the tree. I still have a few from their first Christmas in 1935 as well as from our first Christmas in 1969.

Finished with our tree on Friday, I went upstairs to Grandma's on Saturday. I had the wonderful luxury of my grandparents living in the flat above—an intention of my parents when they bought their only house in 1955. Up at Grandma's, I was in charge, and it felt great! Grandma unwrapped all the ornaments and I hung them wherever I pleased—all but the two originals that Grandma made sure hung in a prominent spot. Little did I realize how much more was going on as we decorated the tree. The small bits of conversation, the reassuring "Oh, that looks nice there!" and the twinkling glances from Grandma, all were a part of my sense of belonging. I now often wonder if Grandma thought back to her early Christmases as she watched me put up the lights, hang the ornaments, and ever so carefully place the tinsel.

Christine and I missed the past two Christmases, and we now wait excitedly for our first Christmas in our home in Missouri. We purchased a ninefoot tree last year and it will dominate its high-ceiling space. It has been an unsettling two years for us, and I missed not being able to hang the Ornament. Traditions matter and this year I have seen corporate greed we headed home. Dad later cut sweep in and finally obliterate

- 1. Keep decorations at least 3 feet away from heat sources — especially those with an open flame, like fireplaces and candles. And remember to blow out your candles when you leave the room or go to sleep.
- 2. The best decorations are safe decorations, so when you are decorating, make sure not to run cords under rugs or furniture, out of windows, or across walkways and sidewalks.
- 3. If you have a natural Christmas tree water it to keep it fresh and safe. Real trees can dry up and turn into kindling in no time at all. Get rid of the tree after Christmas. Dried-out trees are a fire hazard and should not it's got to go. be left in the home or garage.
- 4. Always turn off your decorations when you leave your home and when you're sleeping. Most deadly fires happen while people are asleep.
- 5. Be mindful of how you are using electrical outlets. If you're using extension cords or adapters that add receptacles, consider having a qualified electrician add more outlets to vour home. Extension cords are a common cause of home fires.
- 6. Only use electronics in dry areas. As tempting as it is, you just can't decorate your aquarium with icicle lights.
- 7. Remember that phones falling asleep to the muffled crooning of Bing Crosby and Michael Bublé, but overheated electronics under pillows and

blankets are dangerous.

- 8. Need a perfect gift idea? Every home needs a working smoke alarm in each bedroom, outside sleeping areas, and on every level, including the basement. And remember to test your own to make sure they're working.
- 9. If you're using a space heater, switch it off before leaving the room. It only takes seconds for a fire to start if a space heater tips over or comes in contact with something combustible, like a blanket or curtains.
- 10. Inspect your decorations and discard any that are damaged or worn out. Talk to your aunt about that life-sized Elvis-dressed-as-Santa statue — it's falling apart, it's creepy,
- 11. Keep batteries stored safely in their packaging and out of reach of anything that might try to eat them, like small children and pets. Eating a battery can be deadly.
- 12. The best gift for your family is to upgrade to arc-fault circuit interrupter breakers or outlets. It is estimated that half of the electrical fires that occur every year could be prevented by AFCIs. All upgrades should be completed by a qualified electrician.



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#### I walked 10,000 steps and now I'm stranded 10,000 steps from home

The "normal" ship has sailed and it didn't have many passengers.

I wasn't on board.

Our habits keep us from boarding that ship. We have the bad habit of having bad habits. Bad habits keep us standing on the dock and are hard to give up because nobody likes a quitter.

It's the Minnesota way to conquer bad habits by replacing them with good habits. I tend to my good behaviors. That's why I walked in our first snow on October 28. It was too early as the first snow always is, but it required no shoveling. That was good. Why did I need to walk in the white stuff? First, you can't write about snow without calling it the white stuff. I believe that's a state law. I walked in the falling snow because I don't like treadmills. A treadmill is an ancient torture device first found in the dungeons of the Middle Ages. Walking on a treadmill is the modern-day equivalent of another torture device—a job. Let me tell you the story of a poor boy born without a single digital device or treadmill to his name. That poor boy was me.

Hi, my name is Al and I am a Fitbitaholic. That's right, I wear a Fitbit, a fitness tracker. Don't judge, lest ye be judged. Do I scurry because I have a squirrel's brain? Possibly. I also walk to tally another day and because I have no cows to fetch. I don't have a smartwatch. Mine is the cheapest Fitbit. I think it's called the Forced March and carried a \$30 price tag, but I got it for \$29.99 because I knew a guy. My Fitbit proves I can lose a race with myself. I walk until there's nothing left of my shoes but sweat.

I remain hopeful because I've never seen a chalk outline showing a silhouette of a Fitbit on a deceased person's wrist.

I have a kind, caring and sensitive Fitbit, my third one. I've worn out two. I shouldn't be proud of that, but I'm afraid I am and hope to wear out many more.

From Where I Sit

Congratulations to the Hawkeye football team, winning their third Big Ten West Division title following a 15-13 slugfest victory over Illinois Saturday at Kinnick stadium. A beat up, battered and bruised offense since week three, the Hawkeyes found some late energy when running back Kaleb Johnson broke through right guard, behind the block of Rusty Feth and bolted 30 yards for the go ahead touchdown with 4:40 remaining. The extra point try was blocked leaving Iowa with a two point lead. From there the Hawkeye defense took control, turning the Illini over on downs followed by another big run by Johnson of 12 yards for a first down that allowed Iowa to run out the clock for their ninth win of the season.

LeShon Williams and Johnson each rushed for over 50

yards. Quarterback Deacon Hill completed 19-29 passes for 167 yards and a touchdown throw to tight end Addison Ostrenga, his second score in two weeks.

Defensive end Joe Evans had a sack in the end zone in the first quarter resulting in a safety, Iowa's third two-pointer of the year. Evans now has a team best five and a half sacks.

The Hawkeyes have won nine games ten times in Coach Kirk Ferentz 25 years. The victory is Ferentz' 195th of his career, moving him past Michigan's Bo Schembechler for third place all time as a member of the Big Ten Conference.

Iowa's final regular season game is Black Friday at Nebraska in the annual Hero's game match-up. Kick-off is at 11:00 a.m. Nebraska lost an overtime game to Wisconsin Saturday night.



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time of year, especially during the golden days of radio. I can think of many radio series that brought laughter and warmth into the family home.

Take, for example, the time Jack Benny played Santa Claus for the children of Phil Harris and Alice Faye. Of course the girls knew that Mr. Benny was the fake Santa and laughter ensued throughout the broadcast. Another time was when Ozzie and Harriet were so proud of the radio/phonograph they had for each other for Christmas. But despite that one gift to each other, they decided in the end, that something more personnel should be given to each other.

Probably the greatest radio broadcast of the time was A Christmas Carol performed by Lionel Barrymore. A Christmas Carol was brought to CBS by Lionel Barrymore on December 25, 1934, and each year the Charles Dickens' classic became a listening must for millions. Barrymore's protrayal of the miserly Scrooge was as flawless as anything radio has

Christmastimeis a wonderful ever produced. For his first performance he was supported by Beatrice Lillie, while Alexander Woollcott served as master of ceremonies. In 1936, with the death of Barrymore's wife, his brother John took the role. Orson Welles played Scrooge in 1938 when Lionel became ill. But the following year Barrymore was back, in Welles' own Mercury Theatre, for a full 60 minute production with Welles as narrator. On December 23, 1944, Barrymore did the story in 30 minutes as part of his regular Mayor of the Town series. Many listeners and critics considered A Christmas Carol the greatest Yule story ever done on the air. Until his death on November 15, 1954, Barrymore, with almost clockwork regularity, captured the essense of "the grasping, clutching, conniving, covetous old sinner, Ebenezer Scrooge.



#### Old school pencil sharpener!

The "Climax No. 2" pencil sharpener is a classic and iconic manual pencil sharpener that has been used for many years in schools and offices. It is known for its simple and reliable design. The "No. 2" in its name typically refers to the standard size of pencils that it can sharpen, which includes regular No. 2 pencils, commonly used for writing and drawing.

This type of pencil sharpener typically has a hand-crank mechanism that you turn to sharpen the pencil. As you turn the crank, the blade inside the sharpener shaves away the wood and exposes the graphite core of the pencil, giving it a sharp point. The shavings attached to the sharpener.

This Climax No. 2 pencil sharpener has patent dates dating back to 1900 and 1904. Being one of the earlier forms of mechanical pencil sharpeners, even though this one shows its



age it still is a very collectible item for people that appreciate some of the older and early versions of mechanical pencil sharpeners. Fully restored and returned to its original condition this sharpener has been known to sell for upwards of \$200.

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#### Supper Is on With a Wild Rice Chicken Casserole

Here's our tasty, familyfriendly version of a "Minnesota Hotdish." If the term "hotdish" is new to you, think "casserole" because it's really the same thing — a baked main-dish combo of vegetables, meat, and rice or potatoes, all mixed together with a cream sauce or canned soup.

This satisfying recipe melds tradition and taste in every bite with the nutty flavor of wild rice and the crunch of the water chestnuts. While our family hasn't entered this favorite in one of our Minnesota "hotdish competitions," I can assure you that it's still a winner with family and friends.

When you have Thanks giving leftovers in your refrigerator, you can substitute the chicken for turkey, and a generous dollop of cranberry relish or sauce on the side makes a colorful, tasty accompaniment.

For scheduling convenience, the prep work can be done ahead, if you wish. Assemble the recipe with your kids in a casserole baking dish, cover and then refrigerate overnight. It will be ready to pop in the oven the next day for dinner. While it bakes, slice up hearty crusty bread, then toss salad greens with fresh orange slices and a vinaigrette. Now you're all set for a delicious, warm-you-up, cozy fall meal.

#### WILD RICE CHICKEN CASSEROLE

Serves 6-8

1 (10-1/2-ounce) can cream of chicken soup 1 (10-1/2-ounce) can cream of mushroom soup 3/4 cup mayonnaise

1 1/2 cups cooked wild rice

1 1/2 cups cooked long grain white rice

4 cups cut-up cooked chicken

1 cup diced celery

1 cup diced red pepper (substitute: green bell pepper)

3/4 cup chopped green onions

1 (8-ounce) can water chestnuts, drained and loosely chopped

1/3 cup slivered almonds, lightly toasted Chopped fresh parsley (optional)

Preheat oven to 350 F. In a large bowl, combine soups and mayonnaise. Stir in cooked wild and white rice, chicken, celery, red pepper, green onions, and water chestnuts.

Transfer into a 9-by-13-inch baking dish. Bake, uncovered, for 50-55 minutes until bubbly.

Remove from oven and sprinkle toasted almonds and fresh parsley on top. Serve piping hot.

**Shopping Tip:** In many grocery stores, there are 6-ounce boxes of combined long grain and wild rice that can yield 3 cups of cooked rice for this recipe.

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• 4-4-1/2 lb whole beef tenderloin Cremer's Rub-Me-Tender Seasoning

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Season tenderloin with Cremer's Rub-Me-Tender seasoning.

Place tenderloin in roasting pan or on cookie sheet.

Roast tenderloin for 30 minutes or until 130 degrees internal temperature for medium rare (10 minutes additional for medium well).

#### Cremer's E-Z Whole Beef Tenderloin

Remove tenderloin from oven, cover with foil tent, and let rest for 15-20 minutes.

Internal temperature may increase 5-10 degrees while resting—due to residual heat.

Slice tenderloin into 1/4" to 1/2" slices. End piece will be more done and center of roast more rare.
