In an emergency seconds matter. One of the biggest obstacles that many emergency services face is not being able to locate the house, apartment or business to which they were called. Many times this is because the building is not properly marked with the address, apartment or suite number. Here are some tips on how to make sure YOU can be located quickly in an emergency.

Houses, apartment buildings and commercial buildings require the numbers of the address to be posted on the respective building. The street name is not required. The numbers must be attached on the address side of the building. If a building has multiple addresses such as a duplex, apartment or commercial building, then those addresses must be posted on the corresponding sides of the building that the address is for.

The numbers must be large enough to be seen from the street. A minimum of 4-inch numbers is what is required for commercial structures. This allows emergency personnel the ability

to identify a building without having to exit the vehicle. Using this minimum size of numbers is recommended for private residences and apartments as well. Using numbers that contrast with the building is also helpful. Using white numbers on a light colored building will make it more difficult to see than using darker colored numbers on a lighter background and vice versa.

Placement of the numbers is also important. Make sure the address is placed in an area that is free from obstructions such as shrubs, overhangs and other objects that may make it difficult to see. Addresses should be at a height that can be seen easily as well. If you live down a long lane or sit back off the street, make sure the address is posted at the end of the lane or near the street. If you live in an apartment or work in a building that has multiple tenants, make sure the apartment number or suite number is posted on the main door of that space.

### Cuzzie's "Act" Wouldn't Sell!

Maury, Grandpa almost forgot this crazy baseball memory ever happened. It occurred when Leo Schlueter (our first and great manager) was just beginning to really form our team. Recently, while watching a White Sox game, Ken "Hawk" Harrelson, the Sox play by play announcer, commented on too many pitchers, when a bunt is attempted resulting in a short pop up (with a man on first), reflexively catch it when they should not. Odds are they could easily get a double play by letting the ball drop. This caused me to remember one of the craziest and most puzzling situations that ever happened in one of our ball games all caused by our third baseman, Cuzzie Ottavi! (That's right, Maury, Cuzzie played third and Grandpa was at shortstop in our formative year. Then our manager, one day, had us trade positions and we stayed that way for the next thirteen years!) Maury, this is what happened:

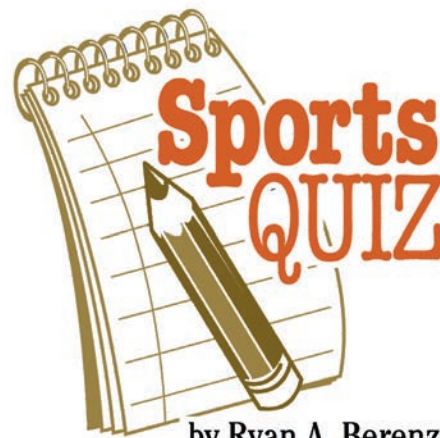
The opposing team was batting with one out and runners on first and second. The next batter hit a screaming line drive to Cuzzie who caught the ball and then "DROPPED IT ON

PURPOSE," stepping on third for the force out and then throwing to second forcing the runner from first for a 5 - 4 double play! The game was held up for at least 15 minutes - nobody, including the umpires, knew what rule, if any, should apply! The opposing team continued the game under protest and nobody knew the correct ruling until the next day. What we subsequently learned was a little known rule for this rare "situation!" Here is that rule: "If, with less than two outs and a runner on first base (with or without any other runners on second or third) an umpire JUDGES that an infielder INTENTIONALLY drops a high fly ball, a line drive or a bunt he will call the batter out after the ball is dropped." (This is similar to the "infield fly" rule but differs in it's not automatic, requires an umpire's judgment and the ball must be touched first). Maury, hope you enjoyed this!

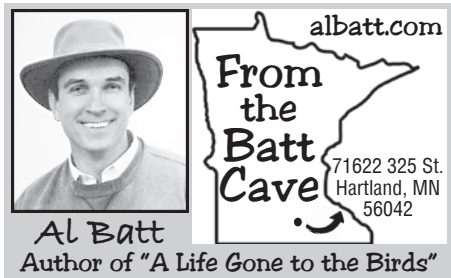

**We encountered significant brumal turbulence**

It was the opening salvo of winter.

Challenging climatic conditions reminded us we're not in charge.

I read William Faulkner's book, "Absalom, Absalom!" which included a 1,288-word sentence. And he wasn't even writing about a Minnesota winter.

Winters can be a long sentence.

Jonathan Coe's 2001 novel, "The Rotters' Club," contains a 13,955-word sentence spanning 33 pages. I might read that book, but not that sentence.

To paraphrase Ernest Hemingway, winter comes "Gradually, and then suddenly."

It's impossible to avoid every bump in the road and winter is a big bump. Meteorological winter officially started on December 1, marking the beginning of the three coldest months of the year that extend through the end of February. I enjoy winter, but not all of it. It provides me with some free time as I don't spend much time looking for shade or playing lawn darts. Winter makes playing lawn darts difficult—the darts don't stick in the frozen ground, and my lucky dart gets lost in the snow until the spring thaw. The end of the lawn dart injury season creates space in the emergency room for those poor souls who are bad at shuffling their feet (the Minnesota shuffle) and fell on the ice.

Opening lead — ten of hearts.

From the start, a fine declarer envisages the play of the hand as a whole. He is careful not to segregate the problem of how to play to a particular trick from the problem of how to play the entire hand.

Take this case where West leads the ten of hearts against three notrump. It is certainly not difficult for South to conclude that East has a string of hearts headed by the A-J.

Ordinarily, declarer would play the queen from dummy to assure himself of two heart tricks. Certainly, that would be the right way to handle the suit in most hands.

But here the proper play is the nine of hearts, not the queen. The purpose is to get East to duck. South should be focused more on the importance of winning the first trick than in creating an extra trick in the heart suit.

East is not likely to take the ace if the nine is played — and if he does duck, South makes the contract. He wins with the king, overtakes the queen of clubs with dummy's king, takes a diamond finesse and finishes with nine tricks consisting of one heart, six diamonds and two clubs.

Of course, East might prove to be a suspicious soul. When the nine is played from dummy, he might wonder what South is up to and conclude that something is rotten in the state of Denmark. He might then go up with the ace in order to lead the K-Q and another spade, defeating the contract.

South cannot force East to duck the first heart by playing the nine, but he is more likely to accomplish his goal by doing so. If the queen is played instead, East is sure to take the ace and will most probably shift to a spade on the assumption that South has two heart tricks coming.

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# Radio from the 20th Century

Christmastime is a wonderful time of year, especially during the golden days of radio. I can think of many radio series that brought laughter and warmth into the family home.

Take, for example, the time Jack Benny played Santa Claus for the children of Phil Harris and Alice Faye. Of course the girls knew that Mr. Benny was the fake Santa and laughter ensued throughout the broadcast. Another time was when Ozzie and Harriet were so proud of the radio/phonograph they had for each other for Christmas. But despite that one gift to each other, they decided in the end, that something more personnel should be given to each other.

Probably the greatest radio broadcast of the time was *A Christmas Carol* performed by Lionel Barrymore. *A Christmas Carol* was brought to CBS by Lionel Barrymore on December 25, 1934, and each year the Charles Dickens' classic became a listening must for millions. Barrymore's portrayal of the miserly Scrooge was as flawless as anything radio has

ever produced. For his first performance he was supported by Beatrice Lillie, while Alexander Woollcott served as master of ceremonies. In 1936, with the death of Barrymore's wife, his brother John took the role. Orson Welles played Scrooge in 1938 when Lionel became ill. But the following year Barrymore was back, in Welles' own Mercury Theatre, for a full 60 minute production with Welles as narrator. On December 23, 1944, Barrymore did the story in 30 minutes as part of his regular *Mayor of the Town* series. Many listeners and critics considered *A Christmas Carol* the greatest Yule story ever done on the air. Until his death on November 15, 1954, Barrymore, with almost clockwork regularity, captured the essence of "the grasping, clutching, conniving, covetous old sinner, Ebenezer Scrooge."

Listen to AM 1370 KDTH's *Big Broadcast* on Sunday nights from 6 to midnight during the Christmas season and you will hear many Christmas radio favorites, especially *A Christmas Carol* with Lionel Barrymore.

# Plant Talk

## We Must Each Do Our Part

In folk singer Pete Seeger's song "If It Can't Be Reduced" he tells us to reduce, reuse, repair, rebuild, refurbish, refinish, resell, recycle or compost as much as possible. I recall one visit to the scrap yard while we still lived in Iowa. My car was stuffed with metal scrap of all sizes and types and I knew this was going to be the "big one", the one that might finally stop the family smirks, the incessant comments to clean up my mess, the question of just how much time I spent for how much money I got. They did not get it. It's not the money; rather, it's the unwavering belief my efforts are helping the earth. When I returned home from the scrap yard with a \$55.00 check my family was impressed, but I wondered if I convinced them to become better recyclers.

Living now in Missouri, I'm shocked that there are no recycling efforts in my area. No one has a recycling bin, no recycling trucks come around, and the only way to recycle metal is to drive it to a scrap yard in another city. That aside, perhaps metal recycling is not for you. As gardeners, recycling is second nature to us only we may call it "tilling under" or better yet: composting!

January is a fine time to consider improving our composting habits through some kitchen practice runs. I've shared stories of Grandma every so often giving me eggshells from breakfast and telling me to bury them in the flower beds. Mom and Dad also put scraps from the kitchen right into the flower beds and all I knew was we had the darkest, richest soil around brimming with fishing worms!

I recently contacted an old friend and gardener for ideas to build a simple compost bin. Dan is deeply rooted in caring for the earth and he, along

with his wife Carol, has some acreage off the beaten path where they quietly connect with Nature. Well, not too quietly. Dan blogs about gardening and he also creates YouTube "instructables" to help others create projects often aimed at the outdoors. He shared the following instructable for constructing a simple compost bin you can build this winter. Just go to this web site and you'll find the simple step by step process. <https://www.instructables.com/Compost-Bin-Wood-and-Wire-Mesh/>

Once you've got the bin situation solved, it's time to practice the Kitchen Yes-No Game until you have a solid understanding of what can and cannot go into your bin. Following in A-B-C order are two simple lists of acceptable and forbidden scrap items.

**Good Stuff:** Apple and their peels, cabbage and other similar vegetable leaves, carrots, celery, coffee, eggshells, grapefruit and other thick skin fruits, lettuce, onion peels, pears, pineapples, potato skins, pumpkin shells, squash, tea leaves, tomatoes, and all the vines and such on which the veggies grow. Of course, dead flowers and untreated grass clippings go in as well, but we'll talk more about those items in a later spring column.

**Bad Stuff:** Most often this stuff rots or attract animals. This includes butter, bones, cheese, chicken, fish and their bones, grounds (coffee), lard, mayo, meat scraps, milk, peanut butter, salad dressing, vegetable oil and yogurt. If you don't scrape your dinner plate into the compost bucket, you'll usually avoid the bad items.

I recommend you keep a small, tight-fitting covered container next to your regular recycling bins. Whenever you shuck ears of corn, remove outside leaves of lettuce, or do anything with the approved compost items, toss the "stuff" into the can and not the garbage. Every so often take the container for a walk to the compost bin and dump in the contents. If there's a hose nearby, rinse out the bucket and toss the water onto the pile.

## The Garden Bug

### Solomon's Seal

"Solomon's Seal" is the common name for a number of species in the genus Polygonatum. These plants display broad, alternating leaves and many clusters of bell-shaped flowers that dangle along each stalk. They prefer rich, moist, well-drained soil, partly or fully shaded. They are drought-tolerant once established, have few insect or disease problems, and are not favored by deer. Beside their use as garden plants, they are used medicinally, and also prepared as food. - Brenda Weaver

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### Webster Chicago Wire Recorder

The Webster Chicago Wire Recorder stands as an important milestone in the history of audio technology. Developed and popularized in the mid-20th century, this device played a significant role in both consumer and professional audio recording before the widespread adoption of magnetic tape recorders. Its innovative use of steel wire as a recording medium set it apart from earlier phonographic technologies and paved the way for future advancements in sound recording.



The wire recorder originated in the late 19th century but gained commercial success in the United States during and after World War II. The Webster-Chicago Corporation, based in Chicago, Illinois, became the leading manufacturer of wire recorders in the country, especially during the 1940s and 1950s. Webster Chicago wire recorders were widely used in homes, offices, and even by law enforcement and the military for dictation, interviews, and surveillance.

Unlike tape recorders, wire recorders used a thin, stainless-steel wire as the medium for recording and playback. Sound was captured by converting audio signals into magnetic impulses that were imprinted onto the moving wire. The wire would pass through a recording head, allowing sound to be stored magnetically. Playback reversed the process, converting the magnetic patterns back into audio signals.

Working Wire Recorders are hard to find with less than 50 showing up on eBay they are a rarity some audio enthusiasts enjoy playing with. Our Wire Recorder was offered for sale as a BIN and sold for just under \$100.00 with tax, and shipping the total was just over \$125.00. We enjoy finding value in the hard-to-find items that many have never seen before.

- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 3 cups prepared mashed potatoes
- 1 cup cooked peas or corn
- 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese

Ketchup or mustard for drizzling on top

Preheat oven to 350 F. In a large bowl, with very clean hands, let your child thoroughly mix together the meat, eggs, breadcrumbs, tomato paste, Worcestershire sauce and seasonings.

Place on a large sheet of parchment or wax paper and form a 9-by-12-inch rectangle. Use a rolling pin to make it even and smooth. Spread the potatoes over the meat with a spatula, leaving a 1-inch border all around. Top with vegetable and cheese.

With adult assistance, your child can roll up the large meatloaf lengthwise, lifting up the paper to get it started. Remove paper and place the meatloaf seam-side down on a foil-lined baking pan. Pat it together firmly, pinch ends closed, and drizzle ketchup or mustard on top.

Bake uncovered for 1 to 1 1/4 hours, or until completely done. Remove from oven and let rest for 10 minutes before transferring to a large serving platter for slicing.

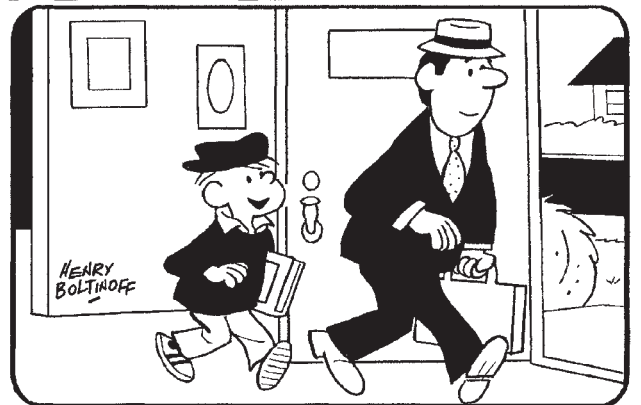

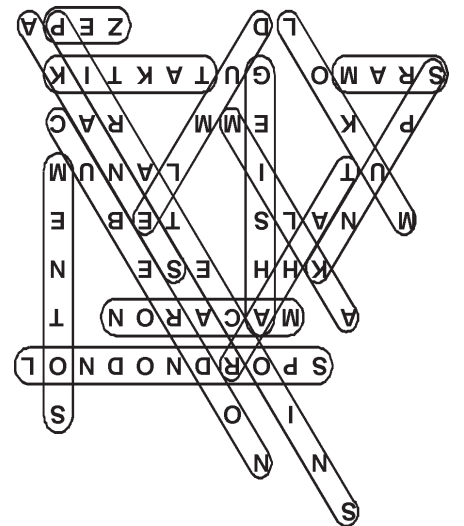
