- · Write a Will A will is very important for anyone who owns property. Without one, state law determines who will receive your assets. Wills should be updated as circumstances change. Wills should be witnessed and notarized at the time of signing so it is not necessary to locate the witnesses at the time of probate.
- Designate an Executor-An executor oversees the settlement of a deceased person's estate. There are two primary criteria for an executor: a person who is organized and efficient and geographical convenience, if possible. Naming multiple executors is cumbersome and time-consuming. A frank Dr. Barbara O'Neill

Estate planning is important discussion, instead, could avoid this dilemma. Another option is naming an attorney as executor.

- · Designate Capable **Proxies**- A durable power of attorney names someone to manage financial and legal affairs if someone is unable to do so. A living will addresses endof-life health care decisions. The person named as a health care proxy in a living will must be willing and able to be assertive about life support decisions with medical personnel.
- · Understand Probate and Non-Probate Assets- Probate is the court-supervised process of identifying and overseeing the distribution of a deceased person's probate assets. Probate assets are those titled solely in a person's name with no joint owner and not held in trust. A will determines how they are distributed. Nonprobate transfers include assets withnamed beneficiaries and assets held in a trust or in joint ownership with rights of survivorship.

An effective estate plan that includes the steps described above provides a framework for dealing with death and/or incapacity in later life. Don't wait. Plan your estate.

Regency style

Furniture revivals have taken place since at least the 19th century and probably earlier. New technology made earlier ornate styles easier and less expensive to make, and therefore more accessible to the average buyer. Some are difficult to distinguish from authentic pieces. If you see the word "style" in a description, it is probably a copy or revival piece, not an authentic piece from the period.

For example, this wine rack is described as "Regency style." It was made in the 20th century, not the Regency period, and it sold for \$813 at New Orleans Auction Galleries. The Regency period was from 1811 to 1820 in England, when King George III's son served as Prince Regent. The corresponding American furniture period is American Empire.

Both Regency and Empire were influenced by classical art of ancient Greece, Rome and Egypt. Mahogany was a favorite wood. This wine rack imitates mahogany with a dark stain on pine wood. The wine rack has a brass gallery on top and ring handles on the sides, features that can be seen on authentic pieces from the Regency period.

Lyman C. Smith and his brothers made guns before they made typewriters. They started making a few typewriters in their gun shop after 1884. In 1887, they sold the gun business and founded Smith Premier Typewriter Co. in Syracuse, New York. It became L.C. Smith & Bros. Typewriter Co. in 1903. The company merged with Corona Typewriter Co. in 1925 to become L.C. Smith & Corona Typewriter Co. Personal computers replaced typewriters in most homes, schools and

offices beginning in the 1980s. Smith-Corona no longer makes typewriters; it now makes thermallabels. The serial number on your typewriter indicates it was made in 1937. Some old typewriters are collectible and sell for a few hundred dollars. A few rare typewriters sell for more than \$1,000. Many common old typewriters sell for \$20 to \$50.



Showing up and shining in the **Show Me State**

I didn't go to St. Joseph, Missouri, because Missouri loves company.

I drove along the edges of things, and the weather was kind enough that I didn't pack any puffy clothing. I joined people who live in a constant state of Missouri to watch basketball while increasing both my joy and my stress levels. Watching a granddaughter who is nothing short of outstanding is joyous, but it can be stressful. When I was a young fellow caught in mischief-making, my father would tell me I'd taken three years off his life. I figure Dad would have lived another 339 years had it not been for me.

Although basketball players aren't allowed to travel, the team still went to Oklahoma for three games in a state that considers the Lone Star flag of Texas to be that state's rating. It's illegal to serve pie without ice cream in Texas. Remember the à la mode. Then, onto Missouri. A poll done by real pollsters found most Missourians say Missouriee versus Missour-uh. It's partly generational, as 16% of those polled who said Missour-uh were 65 and older, and 3% of those who said Missour-uh were below 29.

On my way there, I felt sorry for the workers in the auto plants who install turn signals that are never used. Vultures monitored the highways for food. Highway Helper trucks patrolled the highways in Des Moines, helping stalled vehicles and changing tires. At the Patee House Museum in St. Joseph, there was an ad for Red Goose Shoes, "They're half the fun of having feet." In 1865, the owner of the Patee House, John Patee, was short of cash and meant to dispose of his \$180,000 hotel by lottery. He purchased the last 100 tickets to ensure all of them were sold, and when they drew the winning ticket, Mr. Patee won his hotel.

At the Pony Express Museum, the ad read: "WANTED YOUNG, SKINNY, WIRY FELLOWS not over eighteen. Must be expert riders, willing to risk death daily. Orphans preferred. Wages \$25 per week. APPLY PONY EXPRESS STABLES St. Joseph, Missouri."

A rider could carry only 20 pounds of mail. The maximum weight on a horse was 165 pounds. Models of a rider's boots were on display at the Pony Express Museum. The Al Batt cont. Pg. 14



A couple weeks ago, Maury, when Grandpa was having his weekly (and always very enjoyable) Friday lunch at Mario's with Duke, etc. someone brought up a name immediately causing me to recall this memory. The person involved has passed away years ago but this caused me to remember an incident that was both humorous and also "tugged at the heart strings."

When Grandpa had an office in downtown Dubuque, Maury, I parked my car in a commercial lot just a block away. Across the street was a barbershop. Because of its convenient location for me I became one of its patrons. This led to becoming acquainted with a shoe shine man who operated out of this shop. His name was Lester Gruie. Not only did I get a shine when I was there for a hair cut but I also popped in regularly to get a shine from Les once or twice a week. Less didn't have a "set charge." He relied on his customers to "pay" whatever they choose.

Here, I must explain, Maury, why Grandpa would get his shoes shined a little more frequently than necessary. It was because Les was a

As I recall, Les was on the job for about five years, over which time we had many short 'interesting and at times humorous' conversations. Then, one day when going for a hair cut, Les wasn't there. The barber told me Les had some health problems. A short time later I heard he was in a retirement home somewhere. What happened next, Maury, is why Grandpa has this memory.

Two months later I received a telephone call from Marshalltown, Iowa. When the operator asked me if I'd accept a collect call from a Lester Gruie, I did. Wondering why he called me, we talked for quite awhile. Finally I said: "Why did you call?" Maury, I'll never forget his reply. He said,

"I just wanted someone to talk to!

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Building Better Gardens

"April is the cruelest month. so starts T.S. Eliot's poem "The Waste Land." The lines that follow it are depressing in their upside-down imagery of what we typically think of April. Yet, those words crossed my mind many times this past April what with temperatures going up and down, cold winds blowing against newly emerging foliage, and even freezing rain nipping at tulips and daffodils. It's a strange start to our 2024 spring. In that regard, I want to pass along several ideas you might like to consider trying out in your garden or yard.

Some of you may be familiar with www.instructables.com, a web site where amateurs show, in step-by-step fashion, how to build whatever it is they've posted. My friend and fraternity brother Dan, has many instructibles related to our garden endeavors. I'm going to highlight a few of his along with several others worth considering.

Do you have limited space in which to plant vegetables? One of Dan's latest ideas is to grow squash vertically. Yes, rather than having yards and yards of vines snaking across the ground, use the space above the garden! Go to http://www.instructables. com/id/Grow-Squash-Vertically/ where, in two easy steps Dan shows how to get the squash to go up.


By his own reckoning, "[my] vertical squash plants produced 51 squashes from just 12 square feet of garden space." If growing squash isn't to your liking, try gourds and then go to http:// www.instructables.com/id/Build-a-**Gourd-Birdhouse**/ to see just how easy they are to create. I've made many past gourd bird houses and I can confirm that birds do nest in them.

vining vegetable, you might like Dan's idea of a garden pyramid to add both function and interest to the garden. Yes, it may be easier to lash some poles together and use mesh, but this instructible looks to be fun to make. Look it up at http://www.instructables. com/id/Garden-Pyramid/.

Finally, I'm trying an idea I recently learned about from Dan B., a Master Gardener and now a friend I met in Missouri. We were visiting at my house which has a lot of wooded area around my house, and he asked me if I'd ever heard of "hugelkultur." With an obvious puzzled look, I pled total ignorance. The simplest description would be a mound consisting of logs and branches on the bottom followed by layers of organic material like grass clippings, pruned shrubbery, compost, and other organic matter. In Eastern Europe where hügelkultur originated, these mounds could be four feet wide, eight feet long and several feet high. Plants would then be grown right in the mound.

I'm taking a slightly different approach and building my mound with a 4 x 8 raised metal planter. My grandson has begun scouring my woods for rotting logs and deadfall while I've added various piles of compost and soil. Eventually this pile will be about 16" high and then I will add a planting mix bought in bulk from a local landscape company. I realize by description may be difficult to comprehend so I suggest you check out this link from the Vego Company where I purchased my raised garden. https://vegogarden.com/blogs/ academy/start-your-hugelkulturgarden-beginner-s-guide?_ pos=3&_psq=hugel&_ss=e&_ v=1.0. 

Because of his CBS contract, he sometimes appeared on shows on other networks under the pseudonym Julius Krelboyne. William Conrad died Feb. 11, 1994 in North Hollywood, CA.

VA by the Numbers

The Department of Veterans Affairs has been going all out to provide expanded access to care to veterans. They're calling it Access Sprints, and it means they're scheduling more appointments at night and on weekends, as well as scheduling more veterans into their daily schedule.

The effort seems to be showing progress. Just this year so far the VA has had 25,000 more new patients than they did during the same period last year. Appointments increased by 11%.

Per the stats. 12% fewer new patients had to wait over 20 to 28 days to get an appointment, and 14% fewer new patients are having to wait to see community providers because of wait time eligibility.

This is on top of the care they provided in 2023 in over 116 million appointments.

Other 2023 stats are equally impressive. The crisis line took over 1 millions calls, over 33,000

veterans received emergency care in suicide crises and 5.5 million dental procedures were completed for over 560,000 patients.

Nearly 5 million veterans were screened for toxin exposure, an important step in monitoring their health. (As of March 5, 2024, veterans exposed to toxins and meeting other requirements have become eligible for VA health care, even before enrolling for other VA benefits. This means those who were in the Vietnam War, Gulf War, Iraq, Afghanistan, the Global War on Terror or any other combat zone since Sept. 11. Any who weren't deployed but who trained and were exposed here in the U.S. are included in eligibility.)

Even the non-medical efforts saw success: Ten million veterans have individual pages in the online digital Veterans Legacy Memorial website, with over 5 million of those being created in the last year, and 5.6 million policyholders got life insurance coverage.

The VA was able to hire over 61,000 staffers to provide care to the increased number of veterans seeking health care. bringing the total to over 400,000.

Not a bad year for the VA ... and veterans.

What Seniors Worry About

It's very helpful to have friends and acquaintances scattered across the country when I need to do another informal poll. This time my questions to them concerned what seniors worry about.

I got them started with a list of suggestions on a page, to be ranked in order, with a blank place under each one for comments, and space below for their own contributions.

And I wasn't surprised.

The number one concern was about money. Is there enough to last the rest of our life? Will grocery prices ever come down again? We're concerned about having to go back to work to keep from burning through our savings, running up medical bills, losing the house because of not being able to pay the mortgage and having the rent raised to an amount we can't pay.

Health was the second biggest concern, with loss of independence topping that list. We fear getting dementia, losing muscle strength, falling and breaking a limb, having to go into the hospital or rehab for an extended stay, catching Covid or a bad flu. This was a very long list with everyone adding comments.

Concerns about safety was surprisingly high in the rankings. We worry about crime on the streets, not being able to trust our financial advisers and that we might need to give up driving.

Other topics ranked lower, but they're concerns just the same. We worry about identity theft and not being able to recover from it if we lose money. Tied with that are concerns that we might not recognize scams. We worry about needing to ask others for help with things we used to be able to do.

But the one topic that garnered the most comments was loneliness. We fear losing all our friends when they die. We fear being the last one standing.

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

- A topcoat a day keeps the manicurist away! Revive your polish by giving the ends a quick coat of clear topcoat daily to extend the life of your manicure.



Some plays in bridge are not seen very often, largely because the opportunity to use them is relatively rare. But when they arise, they can spell the difference between success and failure, so the conscientious player must continuously be on the lookout for them.

Take this case from a teamof-four match. At both tables South got to four hearts and West led the king of clubs. This was followed at each table by a spade shift at trick two.

At the first table, declarer won the spade with dummy's king and, in an attempt to reduce the possibility of a spade ruff, led a heart to the ace and continued with the jack.

This approach failed to produce the desired result when West took the jack with the king and shifted to a diamond. Declarer put up dummy's king, but East won with the ace and returned a spade, ruffed by West, so the contract went down one.

At the second table. West's spade shift at trick two was also taken in dummy, but South found a superior line of play that enabled him to make the contract. At trick three, he led the queen of clubs from dummy and, after East followed low, discarded the ten of diamonds!

West took the queen with the ace and switched to a diamond, but the bird had by this time flown the coop. South ruffed, played the ace and queen of hearts and easily scored the rest of the tricks. He had executed a "scissors coup" — a play designed to cut communications between the defenders in order to defuse an impending threat.

It's easy, healthy and perfect every time. Just add personal toppings when it's done for more popcorn pizzazz.

EASY MICROWAVE POPCORN

Makes 5 cups 1/4 cup fresh popcorn kernels 1/2 teaspoon canola or vegetable oil


In a microwave-safe glass bowl that's 6 cups or larger in size, kids can measure and stir popcorn kernels with oil.

Cover the bowl with a microwave-safe plate and microwave on high for about 4-6 minutes (microwaves and popcorn vary), or until there are only 3 seconds between pops.

An adult should carefully remove the bowl and top plate with oven mitts, as it will be very hot. Pour popcorn into a serving bowl, season to taste and enjoy!
