Choirs Program Director and conductor of the Legati Singers. Victoria Bausman, conductor of the Staccati Singers, agreed: "This is the first time that we're doing a more intimate kind of concert...I really like how well...[the] music is incorporated into one theme. It has a really beautiful flow to it that I think also highlights...[the] kids.

And the kids deserve to be highlighted, because this season marks the 10th anniversary of the Children's Choir's founding. When asked how this concert emphasizes its younger participants, Dubuque Chorale Artistic Director Dr. Amanda Huntleigh replied, "The [kids] will be a larger portion of the concert...and we're doing more work together so they can have more time singing. They're also just a little bit more integrated... more woven back and forth between the groups."

The concert's conceptual Threads are woven together by, among other things, recurrent sewing imagery in the program's lyrics. "'needle & thread' is a love song about two broken hearts... mending themselves into one," Huntleigh explained. "We're also doing a four-part partner song [called 'A Silver Thread']."

Otherwise, the Hope & Love of the concert's title are stitched throughout its fabric, as in the children's selection "Give Us Hope." "It has a really great energy and message with it." says Bausman about the song. "I think it's just a really naturally inspiring musical piece."





Can This Dog be Trained?

DEAR PAW'S CORNER:

DEAR DOUG: You've taken on a real challenge: a smart, independent and energetic dog. Petey sounds like a wonderful little guy, though, and I'm so glad you've added him to your family and committed to his well-being.

Building trust with Petey is important so that he knows what to expect from you and the rest of the family. Do that by adhering to a schedule: walks, feeding and training at the same time each day, with as little deviation as possible.

Obedience-training a smart and independent dog requires you to be smart about training, too. Petey needs to know the house rules, and he must want to do the things you're asking him to do (or not do). Look into positive reinforcement methods like clicker training (https:// www.akc.org/expert-advice/ training/clicker-training-yourdog-mark-and-reward/). Commit to a consistent training regimen so that desirable behaviors are reinforced and negative ones are discouraged. Work with a trainer if you are still struggling with Petey after a few weeks.



Gotta Serve Somebody

Bob Dylan has a song titled Gotta Serve Somebody. The song includes a long list of people of all walks of life, but throughout the list there's the reminder, "But you're gonna have to serve somebody." If we were asked to respond to Dylan's assertion that we all gotta serve somebody, what would be our answer?

A noble answer would be to serve others. Certainly many of the most admired and respected people are people that have found ways to serve others, many times sacrificially. I've noticed that more and more news programs are ending with a feel good story of someone helping someone else. So, yes, we hold in high regard those who seek to serve others, even before self.

But sometimes we end up serving someone who is manipulative, selfish, even abusive. We can feel trapped and defeated. There are times, then, when serving someone means breaking away or doing what they don't want us to do, but that which is the right thing to do. It's complicated.

Another common response to Dylan's assertion is that you gotta serve yourself. You have to take care of yourself. There's certainly some degree of truth in the idea of taking care of yourself. Most of us can and should feed, bathe, and clothe ourselves. In a crisis on an airplane you're told to put on your own oxygen mask first and then help a child with theirs, the logic being you have to be conscious yourself in order to help someone else. But often the advice of self-care goes well beyond this, the logic being that the world's a hurtful place and vou better take care of vourself can be your own best friend, maybe even hug yourself. So, yes, some have determined to serve themselves most of all.

The reality is, it doesn't do much for us to affirm our self as our own best friend or to hug our self; it's sort of like a ventriloquist having his vent figure (dummy) say, "I love you." It doesn't hold much meaning. Putting self first ultimately puts us into the isolation of a lonely place. It's complicated.

But there's another possible option of who to serve. Millions upon millions have sought to live out this third option, which has helped them, they have felt, put in balance the two above mentioned options of serving others and serving self. I'm sure you already know where this is leading: the option to serve God first!

This option assumes, of course, a person believes in a personal, perfect God. If not, then you're stuck with the two other options. The option of serving God makes sense and is logical. God's the reason for our existence and everyone and everything around us. His perfection means He knows perfectly well how every part of His creation should work, including us. He's also a personal God who takes personal interest in each of us` and has our best interest, along with the best interest of everyone else, at heart.

Serving God lends itself to finding an ideal balance between meeting the needs of others and having our own needs met. He's looking out for all of us! We'll be able to serve others wholeheartedly and persistently, even without receiving their gratitude or affirmation, because we're doing our loving of others primarily to serve and please God, not the ones we're loving on.





This is the 300 block of 8th Street as seen in the late 1940s. In the far background is the Telegraph Herald office building at 8th & Bluff which was constructed in the 1930s. The building on the corner has a sign which reads "Economy Cleaners" which was at 351 8th St. and owned by Delbert Graves and Collings Sommerfield. Several apartments were located on the upper floor. The Tasty Sandwich Shop was located in the same building for a short period of time. Further down the street was the Radio Shop, owned by Herbert Jennes who had just relocated from Main Street to the 8th St. location around 1948. Here you could purchase a new Crosley or RCA Victor radio, but if you wanted a Philco or Zenith you would have to go to Renier's Music. 





Look at your calendar. Think about school, work, and other events you have scheduled and include those in your plans.

It's okay to be flexible with this plan and make adjustments

Want to take the guesswork on the fly. Stock simple foods, like over the weekend, to grab on those busier days. Include **Use a meal planning** leftovers in your meal plan by making a double batch of a recipe and serve it again the next day or freeze to use later. Using freezer meals are great for busy days when you don't have time to cook.

White Bean Dip


- Serving Size: 2 Tablespoons Serves: 8 **Ingredients**:

Each October we observe Fire Prevention Week. This year we observe it the week of October 8th - 14th, 2023. This year's theme is "Cooking safety starts with YOU." Cooking fires have been and continue to be the leading cause of fires and injuries in the home. According to the National Fire Protection Association, unattended cooking is the leading cause of cooking

creating a safe zone around cooking appliances. This should be at least a three-foot radius around items such as the stove. An even safer way to protect children is to have them stay out of the kitchen when someone is cooking. Remember to keep all handles of pots and pans on the stove from hanging out into the open. This will protect someone from bumping the handle and the contents from spilling or splashing onto them. Keep a fire extinguisher nearby in case a small fire starts. It is recommended to not keep the fire extinguisher in the kitchen as it may be hard to get to in the event of a fire. Find a place, such as a closet, that is near the kitchen where a fire extinguisher could be retrieved safely and used from a safe distance. Make sure the fire extinguisher is hung on the wall, as this helps prevent the extinguisher from being moved or covered up by items, making it harder to find in an emergency. Stay in the kitchen when cooking. If you must step out of the kitchen. even for a brief minute, turn the stove off. When cooking, check on the food regularly. Set a timer as a reminder to you that you are cooking. If you are sleepy or consumed alcohol, do not use the oven or stovetop. Do not use the oven or stovetop to store items in or on. Many people will set combustible materials such as oven mitts, paper towels, cutting boards, etc. on top of the stove or store inside of the oven. These items can start a fire quickly once heated up or they are placed to close to the flame of a gas stove.

Since I was bringing my own phone number and did not want a deal to buy a phone, I was given a \$200 promo gift card to spend anywhere.

The problem was worse than we thought. It wasn't only 32,000 veteran uploads to VA.gov that were caught in a "dead glitches concerned veterans zone" glitch since 2018 with claims left unprocessed. It was an additional 57,000 since 2011.

This newly revealed problem concerned 56,000 veterans who needed to update the number of their dependents - revealed, because it was actually unearthed in 2021.

Consider that problem:

Consider the money you could save with a store affinity account. At my local grocery store, I typically accrue \$5-10 per quarter just for buying the store brand and using the coupons offered.

On Walmart Plus, I often earn \$3-\$4 each time I place online orders for free delivery to my home because of the deals and discounts that pop up on the screen. Additional Plus benefits include travel, video streaming, 10 cents per gallon saved at several gas stations and more. The first 30 days are free to try the service, with a whole year costing \$98. If you're on SNAP, Medicaid or other programs, vour cost would be half that.

Take a look at "500 Great Ways to Save for Dummies" by AARP. The book is on Amazon, Kindle e-reader, as well as thousands of other places online. This book might be one you want to keep for a long time. You can also ask your library or senior center if they will purchase the book to keep on the shelves.

Whether a veteran is adding or subtracting a dependent, it changes the monthly disability benefit amount. Yes, those veterans who tried to add one or more dependents will get that backdated money eventually. But what of a veteran who tried to do the right thing and subtract a dependent? Will the Department of Veterans Affairs want that money back?

An additional nearly 1,000 who tried to appeal a decision about their disability benefits. Apparently, when they tried to get the notice of disagreement online, nothing happened.

And now the VA is taking a close look at the whole system. They're doing what they call a "full review" to make sure everything is working correctly. Part of this will be to watch the system carefully.

Which begs the obvious question: Why are they just now realizing that a computer system needs to be watched? The VA holds the lives of thousands of veterans (and their families) in their hands. It's infuriating to think that so many errors were allowed to happen over so many years and that no one stopped to consider that maybe they needed to investigate, or add software to monitor things, or pay attention to the phone calls from veterans when expected additional benefit money did not appear, or notice when there were changes in how veterans seemed to be using (or not using) the online functions. Meanwhile, on the VA.gov website, the information for changing the number of dependents has this: "Question ... Can I file by mail? Answer ... Yes, but we encourage you to Veterans Post cont. Pg. 14
