Assume you're declarer at five clubs. West leads a spade, and you ruff the spade continuation. How would you play the hand?

Aside from the ace of diamonds, the only other potential loser is your fourth heart. But if West has the diamond ace, a parking place for the heart can be developed by leading twice toward dummy's diamond honors.

The actual declarer therefore led a diamond to the king at trick three, but when East produced the ace and returned a spade, another plan was needed. So after ruffing the

spade, South cashed the A-K of trump, hoping the missing clubs were divided 2-2.

When East showed out on the second trump, declarer tried the K-Q-A of hearts in hopes that the opposing hearts were divided 3-3, or that West, who had the third club, had the heart length. Unfortunately, West ruffed the third heart for down one.


Though declarer gave himself several chances to get home safely, he overlooked an approach that didn't require a favorable break in either hearts or the trump suit. After the diamond ace proves to be offside and declarer trumps the spade return, he should cash the A-K of trump, lead a diamond to the queen and ruff a diamond. A heart to the queen is followed by another diamond ruff.

At this point, declarer has the A-8-6 of hearts while dummy has the jack of clubs and K-4 of hearts. A low heart is led to dummy, and the jack of clubs is played, extracting West's last trump as South discards his heart loser. Declarer then takes the last trick with the ace of hearts.

In this way, declarer nullifies the location of the diamond ace and the uneven divisions in clubs and hearts. In all, he scores three club tricks, four ruffs in his hand, three hearts and a diamond for a total of 11 tricks.

Antique Tools

Early 20th-century farms and households had many unusual appliances with identities and purposes that have been lost to time. Look at this device with toothed wheels and a hand crank that sold for \$266 at Conestoga Auction Company in Pennsylvania. Is it a kitchen gadget — perhaps a fruit or vegetable peeler? Some kind of grinder or chopper? In fact, it's a mechanical rope twister.

In the early 1900s, farmers made their own rope. Most people buy it ready-made today. The buyer probably intended to keep this rope twister as an antique instead of using it as a tool. But someone crafty, curious or very dedicated to "do-it-yourself" can buy modern, usable rope twisters or kits online.

I bought a vase shaped •like a goose at a garage sale 20 years ago for 25 cents. It's about 12 inches tall and the back is open like a vase. It's marked "HB Quimper." It looks hand painted. What can you tell me about it and what, if anything, is it worth?

made by three different factories in Quimper, France, beginning in the late 17th century. Pierre Bousquet founded the first factory in 1708. It became the HB Factory (Hubaudiere-Bousquet) in 1782, after Antoine de la Hubaudiere became the factory manager. HB merged with two other factories in 1968. After more changes in ownership, the factory became Henriot-Quimper in 2011. Variations of the HB Quimper mark were used from 1895 to 1984. Your goose vase with an open back is a planter. One sold recently for \$40, although some sellers are asking higher prices.

Allow that affirmation to also heal your stresses of a time unlike any of us have faced. When I see tulips in bloom, when I sense the heady scent of hyacinths, when I later see flowering trees burst forth in colors from across the palette, I am at peace and know goodness does find its way into the harshness of our lives.

We can't control the heat or the storms, but we can help ourselves feel less stress from the extremes we now too often face. Tell your city, state, and federal governments to use permeable pavement materials that will absorb more water and send less of it cascading in torrents down the streets. On a personal level, create rain gardens to absorb excess run-off from storms. Participate in tree programs and plant as many as you can. Trees will cleanse our environment of the toxic abominations we have cast as plagues across the face of nature and, where grown in abundance they'll provide a shade canopy.

This fall, do something more to help Mother Nature. No, we will not stop storms or end nature's damage from wind or fire, but we are able to do more help than harm. My plan includes planting some Serviceberry shrubs to attract birds while I also clean up debris in my woods left by unthinking humans. My point is not to elevate myself here: rather. I'm pointing out that each one of us can and must influence present society and future generations. Don't be ugly in your thinking and say: "What's the point? Nature always wins." It's not about winning; rather, it's about not losing

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

Missed again. He wasn't good at enforcing a no-fly zone.


I finished my malt. It was powerful good. "I think I've got to go," I said.

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

Hawkeye fall sports are busy in this 90 degree heat.

Iowa football's new look offense, buoyed by a number of transfers, has been working on timing and chemistry. So far so good. Michigan transfer, quarterback Cade McNamara is the new #1 under center. 13-3 as a starter for the Wolverines, McNamara is tested and tough. He has several veteran tight ends to throw to (what else is new). Luke Lachey returns as the top target but will get able assistance from another former Wolverine in Erick All, and Sun Prairie, Wisconsin native Addison Ostrenga. The wide receiver room has added transfers in freshman Kaleb Brown from Ohio State and veteran Seth Anderson, who starred at Charleston Southern last season.

Ends Joe Evans and Deontae Craig lead an eight man rotation up front, that could include former Hempstead star Anterio Thompson. A 6'3, 290 pound sophomore who starred in his only year at national junior college champion Iowa Western, the coaches love Thompson's aggression and quick first step off the snap of the ball.

The Hawkeyes boast one of the nation's top punters in Tory Taylor, who averaged 45.4 yards and was an All-American last year.

Iowa opens the season September 2nd, hosting Utah State at Kinnick Stadium. The Hawkeyes are picked to finish 2nd behind Wisconsin in the Big Ten West division. The Hawks and Badgers collide at Camp Randall Stadium in Madison October 14th.

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A voice that was very popular during the golden days of radio was that of Walter Tetley. Born in 1915, Walter appeared as Leroy Forrester for the entire run of *The Great Gilderlseeve*. Due to a glandular disorder, Tetley remained, like Leroy, perpetually locked in a preadolescent state of below average height with the vocal capabilities of immature youth.

Walter turned this unusual condition into a career asset as he became a master of playing the "wise beyond his years" smart aleck who could match wits with his elders even if he happened to be older than the actors playing opposite him.

Tetley moved on from ensemble work on childen's shows such as *Let's Pretend* and *Coast to Coast on a Bus* to step out on his own on *Raising Junior* and the Fred Allen Show. He even appeard on Fibber McGee and Molly for one episode and that appearance caught the eye and ear of the producers that where selecting actors for The Great Gildersleeve. They chose Tetley for Gildy's nephew after hearing the audition from May of 1941. He was also fortunate to get the part of Julius on the Phil Harris and Alice Fay radio show in the mid 1940's.

Tetley's voice was his fortune, his body was his misfortune, particularly after a motorcycle accident, from which he never fully recovered, and spent his last days in a wheelchair. He died in 1986.

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

Pottery Bowl is a surprise!

Occasionally a piece of history from the Southwest makes its way to the Midwest. We had a client bring in a beautiful black bowl with the names Maria and Santana written across the bottom. The bowl was small, only 6 inches wide and 4 inches tall. The contrasting black design was distinctive and attractive to collectors.

Our research revealed a "Maria & Santana Black Ware Pueblo Pottery Bowl." It is a type of pottery made by Maria MartinezandherhusbandJulian Martinez, who were renowned Native American artists known for their black-on-black pottery. Maria Martinez was a Pueblo woman from San Ildefonso Pueblo in New Mexico, and she is often credited with reviving and popularizing the traditional Pueblo pottery techniques, particularly the black-onblack style. This style involves creating intricate designs by carving or painting black designs onto a black pottery surface, creating a striking



contrast. Santana Martinez was Maria's son and a talented potter who worked closely with his mother in creating pottery pieces. Together, they produced highly sought-after pieces that are considered art pieces as well as cultural treasures.

We photographed this bowl and gave it a listing on eBay for a 7-day auction cycle starting at \$375.00. At the end of the auction, we had attracted 4 bidders that entered 7 active bids with the winning bidder paying \$787.00. Examples of Maria and Santana pottery can exceed \$1,000 depending on the size and condition of the individual item.

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Make a Family-Style Salade Nicoise

It's market time! On weekend mornings, I like to saunter through our neighborhood farmers market amid the crowds of people in shorts and sandals. who, like me, are attracted to the "picked at their peak" vegetables, flowers, eggs, honey and jams in colorful stalls. Adults and kids alike visit with vendors, while friends happily bump into one another for a chat.

Since produce is overflowing at markets and grocery stores, there's no better time to make a fresh, easy-to-prepare dish that the whole family will love. I was once inspired by my friend, Ann Francois, to make a big salade nicoise for the centerpiece of her dining table at a gathering of our friends.

While I have vivid memories of traveling in southern France and feasting on this country salad typically composed of tomatoes, tuna, hard-boiled-egg halves and anchovies on a bed of lettuce dressed with a vinaigrette, Ann's version featured the addition of locally sourced new potatoes and mounds of green beans. Each ingredient was artfully arranged on a platter and served with crusty French bread.

Make this healthy salad with your kids for a light, simpleto-prepare, end-of-summer main course. What makes it so family-friendly is that you can tweak it to suit everyone's tastes. Add artichoke hearts, capers or grilled red peppers. Don't like anchovies? Skip them!

SALADE NICOISE

Serves 6

- − 1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar

- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1 clove garlic, minced1/2 teaspoon salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- -1 head Boston lettuce, separated into leaves, washed and dried
- -1 pound firm green beans, preferably French string beans (haricot verts), cooked just beyond the tender-crisp stage and chilled
- 1 pound new potatoes, cooked and halved
- -2-3 (5 or 6 ounce) cans albacore solid white tuna, drained and flaked, or grilled fresh tuna, cut into chunks
- 3 large vine-ripe tomatoes, sliced into wedges
- 3 hard-boiled eggs, halved lengthwise
- 1 cup pitted black olives
- 1 (2 ounce) can anchovy fillets rinsed and patted dry (optional)

Make the Vinaigrette: In a jar, let kids combine the oil, vinegar, lemon juice, mustard, garlic, salt and pepper. Shake vigorously, then set aside.

Assemble the Salad: Working together with your kids, arrange the lettuce over a large serving platter. Top with mounds of the green beans, potatoes, tuna, tomatoes, eggs and olives. Drape the anchovy fillets (if using) over potatoes.

Drizzle vinaigrette over the salad. Serve.
